### HYPONOTIC PLEA SUCCESSFUL.

The attorneys for the defence in the Macdonald-Patton-Grey murder case at Wellington, Kan., have successfully maintained the theory that their client acted under hypnotic influence, and on Monday evening Macdonald was acquitted of the murder of Patton on this ground. Anderson Gray, the man who hypnotized Macdonald, was found guilty of the murder a few days ago and received a death sentence. It was shown that Gray hypnotized Patton into doing as he wished, and that he came to Wichita and employed Macdonald to go to his farm, and immediately gained a complete mastery over Macdonald's mind. After a few days he conveyed to his subject the idea that Patton was his (Macdonald's) mortal enemy, and he gave him a rifle, took him to a secluded spot near a road leading from Patton's house to the farm, and on the next night this Macdonald did. Before his death Patton implicated Gray, and the latter was arrested. During Gray's absence Macdonald regained control of himself, and the story he told, corroborated as it was by others, convicted Gray and saved his own neck. It developed that Gray had started this influence over others, and that he had in this way made a previous attempt to put Patton out of the way.

### MEETING AT NINE MILE CREEK.

Pursuant to notice a large and influential meeting of the inhabitants of Lunenburg, was held at the Nine Mile Creek schoolhouse on the 10th inst. Mr. Archibald McNeill acting as Chairman and the undersigned Secretary. The object of the meeting was to devise means to secure further communication on Rocky Point Ferry, and the opening of a new road from McGregor's Corner to Canoe Cove on the boundary between the estates formerly held by Messrs. Cumberland and Wright.

Mr. John Rae first addressed the meeting, and dwelt for some length upon the inconvenience upon Rocky Point Ferry, particularly the loss of time and money so early in the evening during the shipping season, and showed that by the opening of the new road, the traffic on the Ferry would be largely increased. Mr. Neil M. McKinnon explained the reason for the Hon. Donald Ferguson's absence, and other representative of the Hon. Joseph White being present.

The following gentlemen also addressed the meeting, viz: Messrs. James McLean, Dugald Currie, Andrew Dickson, John McNeill, Mr. Andrew Dickson was of the opinion that the opening of the new road would be overbalanced by the increased traffic it would lead to on Rocky Point Ferry, and Hon. Joseph White pronounced the measure his hearty support. Some discussion then took place regarding the location and cost of the new road, when the following resolutions were passed unanimously:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to ascertain the cost of opening this road, and said committee be a delegation to wait upon the Government and lay the matter before them.

Resolved, That this meeting appoint a delegation to wait upon the Government to press the matter of increased accommodation on Rocky Point Ferry: having a daily and hourly steamer to ply on said ferry.

Resolved, That the following committee be appointed: Messrs. Donald Currie, John McNeill and John Holmes.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Wise for his presence at the meeting, and a vote of thanks to the chairman and Secretary, the meeting dispersed.
