Gulf Grenadier Delivered To Georgetown Fish Plant

GEORGETOWN — The official delivery of the steel trawler Gulf Grenadier by its builders, Bathurst Marine Ltd. of Georgetown took place yesterday morning in the Bathurst Marine Ltd. office building and she will now become a member of the trawler fishing fleet operated by Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. of Georgetown.

Taking part in the delivering ceremony were T.W. Sanderson, president Bathurst Marine Ltd., Cyril A. Davis, president Gulf Garden Foods Ltd., Mr. Eric Wood, secretary treasurer Bathurst Marine Ltd., William E. Garden Foods Ltd., and attending the ceremony were: Hon. Lloyd MacPhail, minister of industry and president of the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation and Hon. L.F. Rossiter, minister of fisheries.

WILL INCREASE

The addition of the Gulf Grenadier to the Gulf Garden fleet will immediately increase the company's fish landing by 50 per cent, as the new trawler will carry approximately double the quantity of fish now being landed by each of the four companies smaller trawlers. She is expected to be in operation on the fishing banks in about two weeks and will be manned by 17 of a crew and will carry 1500 ice aluminum boxes for holding fish with provisions made for increasing this number.

The Gulf Grenadier launched on December 11th is the first steel stern trawler wholly designed and built in the Bathurst shipyard at Georgetown and is one of the largest ever built in Canada and especially designed for use of aluminum boxes for handling fish.

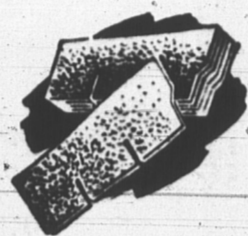
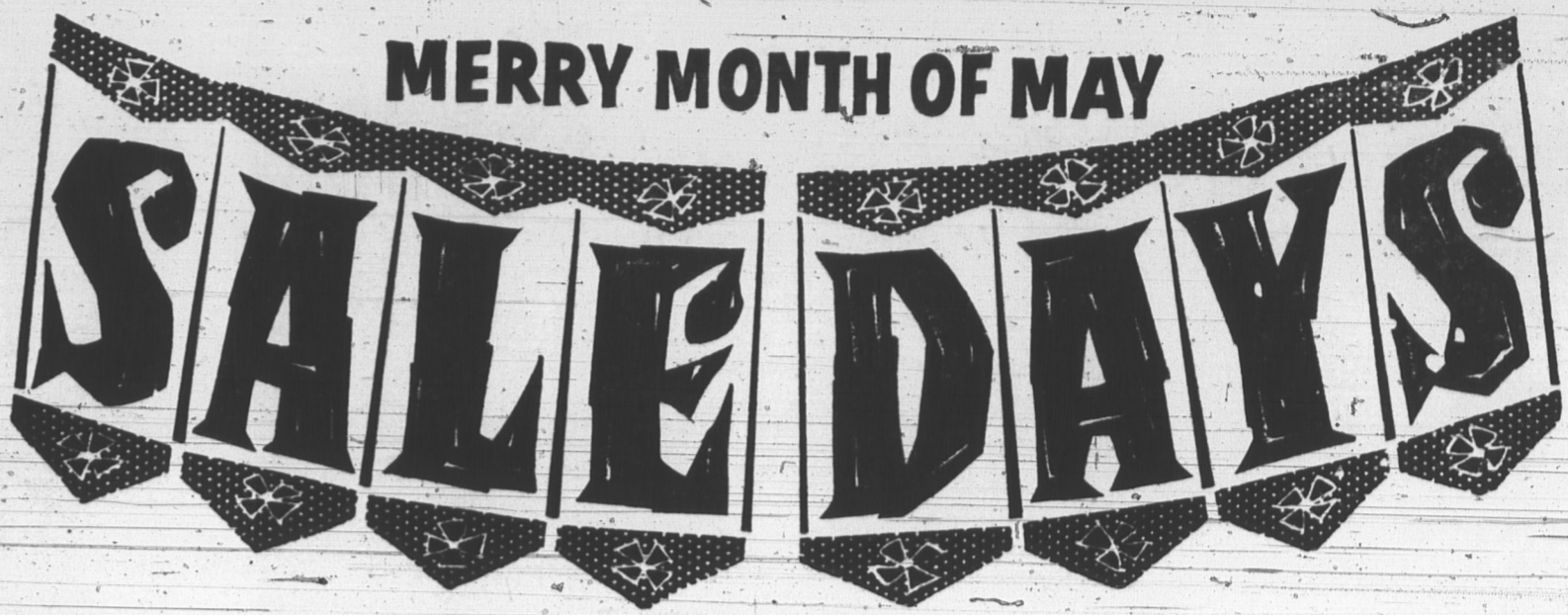

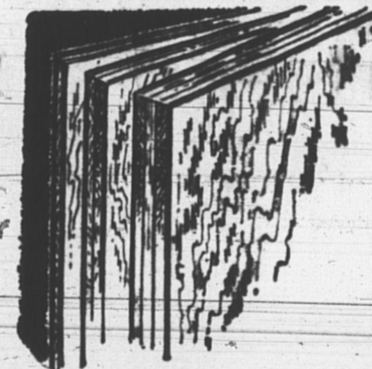
