

Smash Hit Play On Nazi Atrocities Stuns Germans

BERLIN (Reuters)—A smash-hit Broadway play has stunned German audiences into silent acceptance of the grim truth of atrocities committed by the Nazis. The play is The Diary of Anne Frank, which brought over 100,000 people to the 17-year-old American actress Susan Strasberg when this tale of the plight of a Jewish family in Nazi-occupied Holland opened on Broadway last year.

It was given its first German performances Monday night in West Berlin, Duesseeldorf, Hamburg, Karlsruhe, Aachen, Cologne and in the East German city of Dresden.

Deeply-moved theatre audiences in the German cities received the play in shocked silence as the curtain raged on this story of a 12-year-old Jewish girl hiding from the Gestapo in wartime Amsterdam. She later died in a German

concentration camp.

In three theatres, the curtain came down on deafening silence and timid attempts at applause were quickly snuffed. But in Hamburg, Karlsruhe, Aachen and Dresden the audience remained silent for several minutes and then sincerely applauded the actors.

ASHAMED

Leo Mittler, a Jew who directed the play in Duesseeldorf, said Tuesday that many persons called the theatre after Monday night's opening to say the performance caused them to feel deeply ashamed.

Mittler added: "Even newspaper critics called me to say that they just did not know what to write in their columns. Every body agreed it was most important to produce such a play in Germany."

When movies actually taken in

concentration camps were shown to German audiences just after the end of the war, they were received with derision and disbelief.

But the reception given to this play—based on the actual diary written by Anne Frank between 1942 and 1944—was different. The impact of its portrayal of the horrors of Nazism struck home.

Jews took a leading part in the staging and acting of the play in its seven city performances.

The evening newspaper Nacht-Depeche says the premiere of the play in West Berlin made everyone who saw it remember the words of President Theodor Heuss: "The worst thing that Hitler did to us—and he has done a lot to us—we to force us to be ashamed of bearing the name German together with him and his companions."

Says Gov't. Aid Available For Roadside Picnic Development

It is situated at the foot of Bell's

Hill, two miles from Montague, and through a great amount of labor on the part of members, trees were cleared, parking space provided, brush cleared, pump installed, and stones painted, all to make a more pleasing setting for travellers who stopped to use the facilities provided. Through this project by the Junior Board of Trade, the Government has passed an order in council granting up to one hundred dollars to any organization carrying out a similar project, the site to be approved by Mr. George Fraser, of the Travel Bureau, money to be paid on completion of project.

Dr. Henry Moysse spoke of the success met in Summerside, when the local Lions Club sponsored a competition for the beautification of grounds and gave a complete outline of the project.

Among the topics discussed were sewage and water supply, white lines on the paved roads, dumping of garbage and especially the havoc wrought by gravel digging along the highways.

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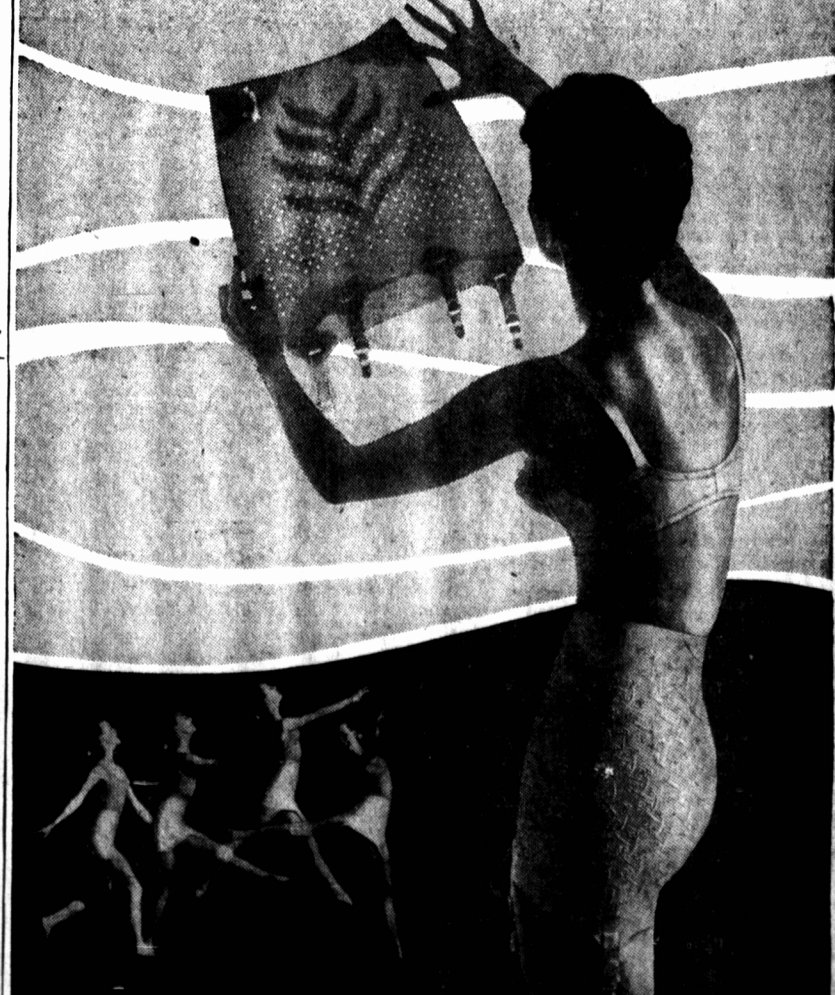
