TEACHERS' INST. MEET.—The meeting on Saturday evening was one of the most successful held this year. The discussions this year have been of a very practical character, and especially so the meeting of Saturday evening. The interchange of ideas upon the different subjects has aroused an enthusiasm among the teachers, has incited many new ideas and has certainly been productive of very great benefit when carried into the schoolroom. The teaching of geography was the subject under discussion on Saturday evening. It seemed the unanimous decision that text book work in this subject should be discontinued, at any rate until the district has been made acquainted with nature from actual observation and with the manner of representation of the different physical features of a country on a map. Solar camera, slated country, and sliding boards were strongly recommended for use in the schoolroom. The pupil should learn to draw actual observations of the country and to draught country, to be shown by the slatted sketches of these on paper and slatted globes and produce fac-similes on moving board. This would arouse an interest in the study, and the interest thus aroused would be carried to the study of the geography of other countries. The lesson given by Principal McSwain on drawings, as it bears on botany and kindred sciences, was greatly appreciated by the large body of fellow teachers present.

A RAPID TRANSIT DREAM. According to Lawyer John W. Hill, of Chicago, the one hundred miles an hour road is in evidence. Mr. Hill has secured the necessary papers for the incorporation from the Secretary of State in Springfield, of the Intercoastal Electric Railway, capital \$200,000,000.

"The Intercoastal Electric Railway," said Mr. Hill, as its name signifies, is proposed to run from New York to San Francisco. The persons for whom I have secured the primary papers are capitalists of Chicago and New York, who are able to make good money out of the incorporation, profitable as the capital of \$200,000,000 may appear. The magnitude of the capitalization is made necessary by the immense requirements of such a project.

"The initial purpose of the corporation—the construction of an elevated electric railway from Chicago to New York—would itself absorb \$140,000,000. It is of course premature to discuss the possibilities of the scheme. At least three years will be required to organize the company and secure the necessary charters from the states traversed, and the main purpose of the corporation is to enable commencement in this direction to be made."

PEACE COURT.—Five Scott Act cases were up for hearing before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day. Two charges against Geo. O'Leary were dismissed and one adjourned till Thursday next. The case against Mary Ann Harrington was adjourned until the 15th, and Arthur Thorne, for a first offence, was fined \$50 and \$23.35 costs or two months imprisonment. J. J. Johnston appeared as Counsel for the latter two.

DESTRUCTION IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—Late news from St. John's is to the effect that destruction is increasing there. Lady O'Brien's fund relieved 5,300 persons in St. John's during March, and distributed 182 tons of coal. A sum of \$2,300 was sent to the outports. The clerical committee has also distributed relief on a large scale, besides managing the soup kitchens.

CONDEMNED.—The St. John Sun says: The bktn. Erema, which sailed from St. John Feb. 11 for Liverpool, dealt ladies, and put into Bermuda in March 6 leaking, has been condemned. The Erema is owned in P. E. Island.
