

# Undefeated Tiger-Cats Clash With Alouettes Today

Undefeated Hamilton Tiger-Cats will try out a new running attack against Montreal Alouettes in a Big Four football action today. With burly Gerry McDougall out of action and his power back partner, Hubert Bobo, put on waivers Friday, the Tics have to try something new in Montreal. Coach Jim Trimble will go with

ex-Cleveland fullback Milt Campbell and former Windsor AKO junior Zeno Karez.  
In the other league game Ottawa Rough Riders will tackle the team with the quarterback problem, Toronto Argonauts, in Toronto.

The Argos, with controversial quarterback Ronnie Knox still not ready to play after arriving here only this week, will slip Dick Shatto back into that position despite the fact that Shatto said last week that he was glad to be out of the job when Jack Crabtree was to take over for him.

**CRABTREE VANISHES**  
Crabtree, like Knox, needed a week to learn the team's plays, but injured his knee before his memory was tested. He's left for parts unknown.

The Tics, who have won five straight games and hold a six-point margin over second-place Montreal and Ottawa, were to put Campbell out alongside McDougall but Gerry is still nursing the knee injury suffered in the game against Ottawa last Sunday at Philadelphia.

Ottawa will make two changes—Hardiman Cureton will replace Frank Sweeney at guard and Ron Stewart will move over for Karl Hilzinger.

Joe Nicely, Montreal's 235-pound guard from Baltimore Colts, is a doubtful starter. He injured his back in practice.  
Homebred centre Bob MacLellan has a bruised knee and Tom Higo may play either guard or centre—or both. NFL cut Richard (Bo) Dickinson, who joined the team last week, may play fullback and Johnny Fedessoff, out of action for weeks with a shoulder injury, may also dress.

## Dempsey Rates Chuvalo Best Canadian He's Seen

NEW YORK (CP)—Jack Dempsey, an authority on hard punchers, rated George Chuvalo Thursday the best he's seen from Canada.

Chuvalo, who wrapped up the Canadian heavyweight title Monday by belting James J. Parker out in the first round of their title fight at Toronto, is to move into Madison Square Garden for his first bigtime U.S. fight Oct. 17.

He is a graduate of the annual heavyweight tournaments sponsored in Toronto by Dempsey and Toronto promoter Deacon Allen.

"Chuvalo is the best to come out of those tournaments," said Dempsey, the former world heavyweight champion. "He has a stiff left hook and is a good boxer. He's short for a fellow weighing more than 200 pounds, but he can belt."

Chuvalo, ranked 10th in the heavyweight division by Ring Magazine, has won 11 of his 14 bouts, eight by knockouts. He drew with Alex Miteff.

He will be facing Pat McMurry at the Gardens. McMurry, one of the more promising lights on the U.S. heavyweight scene, has 23 knockouts in 32 battles. He has lost only three.
