Little Miss Elizabeth Ann MacLean spent a few days recently at the home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Ramsay.

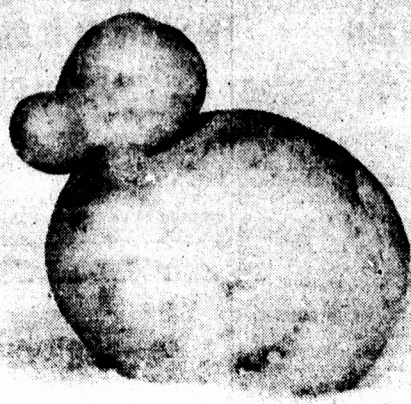
