A commission of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in Alberton Church Friday evening for the purpose of inducting Rev. Murray Gardner as minister of Alberton pastoral charge which includes the congregations of Alberton, Casumpec and Tignish. In the presence of a large congregation the solemn service was conducted by Rev. D. K. Campbell of North Bedouque, chairman of Presbytery, Rev. G. K. Ward of Bedouque, who preached the sermon and Rev. R. R. Wagner of O'Leary, who gave the charge to minister and people.

Death Breaks Link With Early Days Of Alberton

A connection with the early days of Alberton was broken Sunday morning with the passing of Mrs. S. R. Burke. Death came to her at the house which had always been her home—a house built many years ago by her grandfather, her father, James Reid, and later renovated by her father, William Reid. In the early days it was a stopping place for the stage coach. From the older generations of her family Mrs. Burke had acquired much knowledge of an age now gone, and in her home there are some beautiful furnishings which have been in the possession of her family for several generations.  
Mary Victoria Reid was born 77 years ago. Her mother died when she was very young and her only sister died in early infancy. In 1910 she was married to Stephen R. Burke, a former resident of Charlottetown. They had two sons; Milo, who was the victim of a drowning accident near Newcastle, N.B., in 1933, and Stephen of Alberton. Mr. Burke passed away ten years ago.  
Mrs. Burke was a faithful member of the Roman Catholic Church and a good citizen. Her outlook on life was not bounded by narrow limitations and she was considerably of the welfare of others. For a number of years she carried on with success a clothing and variety store. She was a charter member of Alberton Women's Institute and continued her interest and activity in its work as long as health and strength permitted.  
She was a good friend to many people both old and young and at her home everyone was welcome. She had a kind and generous nature which reached out in friendship to everyone and was more than ready to help those less fortunate in life than herself.  
Besides her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen M. Burke, she is survived by one little granddaughter, Mary.  
The funeral will be held Tuesday morning from the Sacred Heart Church with interment in the church cemetery.

Body of N. B. Man Found Off Cape Egmont

The body of Louis Vautour, 23, one of two men who disappeared in a small boat off Cassie Cape N.B., last week, was found Sunday in Northumberland Strait by four fishermen.  
The fishermen were on route from the east coast of New Brunswick to Prince Edward Island when they came across Vautour's body 4 miles off the Cape Egmont-Mt. Carmel area.  
R.C.M.P. at Summerside carried out an investigation and coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan also of Summerside said no inquest will be held.  
The body was identified by a bathing suit, car keys in a pocket of the suit and by a slight deformation in one foot.  
Taken to Summerside last night, the body is being forwarded to N. B. for burial!

Made Pilgrimage To Holy Land

Mrs. Annie Walsh, Summerside, has just returned from a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and various shrines in Europe. She sailed from New York March 15 with a group of 56 Canadians and Americans as part of the first Marian Year pilgrimage to leave New York.  
During their travels the group covered more than 20,000 miles visiting a large number of countries prior to their arrival in Rome.  
Mrs. Walsh states that during their stay in the Arab League countries they were well protected from any possible unpleasantness and to ensure this while they were in Nazareth, a police escort was provided them. In Damascus their courier was asked to get the group out of the city as quickly as possible and they left 24 hours ahead of schedule and just before rioting broke out there.  
In Rome they were received by His Eminence Joseph Cardinal Pizzardo who took them on a tour of the Galleries of the various palaces and showed them countless works of art. While they did not have an audience with the Pope they saw him on several occasions and when the Holy Father received a report of the Pilgrimage he sent an individual gift to each member of the group.  
Pilgrimage travel in the Holy Land is a pleasant and carefree experience Mrs. Walsh reports. In both the Arab League countries and Israel, the hospitality extended is such as to make the western visitor feel welcome, comfortable and well protected from any internal discord. Obvious efforts were put forth to shield visitors from any unpleasantness. For instance, in Nazareth, which the group were told a communist stronghold, a police escort was provided to protect them from "the menace of street peddlers."

AT DAMASCUS

While visiting in Damascus they had the pleasure of dining with a very interesting looking military leader and his colorful retinue of sheikhs who came to stay at the same hotel. He was there to quell the riots which broke out the day after the group had left Egypt that they were told the hotel management had asked their courier "as a protective measure" to take a side street as quickly as possible; which was why the group left twenty-four hours earlier than intended.  
When the group reached Tel Aviv the capital of Israel, a reception awaited them. At a luncheon, Dr. Alisa Klausner, Ph.D., on behalf of the Israel-American friendship league, addressed the group, welcoming them to her country. The leader of the pilgrimage, Mrs. Sophia Nowosielski of Detroit, Mich., was presented with a bouquet of roses.  
In Rome the group were received by His Eminence Joseph Cardinal Pizzardo who escorted them on a tour of the Galleries in the Palaces of the Pope and cardinals. They were shown many beautiful paintings, sculpture and other works of art. Although due to his recent illness, the group were denied an audience with the Holy Father, they did see him on several occasions. At noon and at 6 o'clock each evening from an open window in the Papal apartments, he extended his apostolic blessing to those gathered in St. Peter's Square. When Pope Pius received a report of the pilgrimage from Cardinal Pizzardo, he sent a special little gift to each one of the group.  
Mrs. Walsh is a daughter of the late Mrs. Ellen McGregor and is a native of Charlottetown but is now residing in Summerside.

Resolutions Adopted At S'ide Meeting

Text of resolutions adopted Friday night at the semi-annual meeting of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture held at Summerside.  
"Resolved that this meeting views with deep concern the apparent violation by certain towns in this Province of the 'The Uniformity of Time Act' believing that such violation is a threat to law and order in general. Further be it resolved that this meeting go on record as supporting the principle of one uniform time in this Province, such time to be Standard Time."  
"Whereas the assistance provided by the Federal Government to the potato industry in this Province and obtained through the efforts of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board and the Federation of Agriculture was of great value to the Province, therefore be it resolved that this meeting express its appreciation for this assistance."  
"Further be it resolved that the Potato Marketing Board and the Federation of Agriculture be urged to take whatever action may be necessary for the protection of the industry in the marketing of this year's crop."  
"Whereas credit policies are generally designed to suit the particular needs of industry and commerce and cannot always be readily adapted to the requirements of agriculture, therefore be it resolved that this meeting commend the Federation of Agriculture for its action in initiating a study of the farm credit problem and urges that this study be proceeded with as rapidly as possible in order that findings and recommendations may be acted upon at the earliest possible date."  
"Whereas a farmer's wife is allowed accident insurance without joining the Federation of Agriculture, be it resolved that one son engaged on the farm be allowed this accident insurance on his father's membership."

Another resolution extended the thanks of the meeting to all taking part in the program; and thanked the press for interest in the farm movement.

VASSALBORO (AP) — A deer leaped onto the Augusta-Waterville highway Saturday and in a few minutes a car killed the 100-pound doe, two cars and a bus were damaged and three persons injured.
