Foil Can Eliminate Messy Pan Problem

The Chef and I spent a pleasant half hour on the cool terrace comparing notes on easier ways of handling the pot-and-pan washing problem. We both agreed that one way to foil at least part of the clean-up-after-meal difficulty is to use plenty of heavy-duty aluminum foil.

FRYING PANS Line frying pans smoothly with foil in up the sides. The food fries quickly. Remove the foil and the pan is clean. Wrap seasoned vegetables prepared for cooking snugly in foil and boil two or three kinds together in a pot of boiling water. Result, more flavor, minerals and vitamins saved and a clean pot. Place a square of aluminum foil on the oven rack under a frozen fruit pie while thaw-baking. It won't boil over into the oven, but onto the foil, which you can throw away.

CAKES AND ROLLS If a cake or heat-and-serve rolls are getting too brown in the oven, cover with a piece of foil! Line pans with heavy-duty aluminum foil before roasting chicken, turkey, duck or Rock Cornish game hens or before baking fish or meat rechauffees. Happy ending, a clean pan! Cover the bottom of the broiler pan with aluminum foil, not because you are too lazy to wash it, but because you aim to be a
