

Junior Abbies In 8-4 Win Over Dartmouth In Exhibition Game

The Charlottetown Junior Abbies, sparked by the pitching and hitting of Donnie MacLean, came up with two late inning rallies yesterday afternoon to defeat the Dartmouth Juvenile Lions 8-4 in an exhibition game at Memorial Field.

The Abbies put together a single in the sixth inning, four in the seventh and three in the eighth to get back the visitors. The big blow of the Abbies winning rally was MacLean's two-run single in the seventh and Charlie Kennedy's three run double in the eighth.

The redoubtable "Funnell" MacLean, whose great pitching was backed by almost perfect support from his team-mates entered the game in the sixth inning as a relief pitcher for Ian "Weasel" Kennedy.

The Lions were leading 3-0, the

bases were loaded and two men were out when MacLean entered the pitchers box. In less than a minute the inning was completed for MacLean threw three pitches at Art Jackson of Dartmouth and struck him out.

For the rest of the way MacLean remained in command. He gave up only one hit and 15 was a triple into centerfield by Ernie Parker, Dartmouth relief pitcher. MacLean struck out seven men in the three and one third innings that he worked. He did not issue a walk.

Ian Kennedy, who got his first starting assignment on the mound, turned in a fine effort but Kennedy failed to get the batting support necessary to win ball games. Ian gave up three runs, four hits, six walks and struck out four. He

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Canada Loses Top Team And Individual Prizes At Famed Bisley Meet

DISLEY, Surrey, England, July 20.—(CP)—Canada Saturday lost the top individual and team events of the Bisley rifle meet which she won last year—the Queen's Prize and the Rajah of Kolapore Imperial Challenge Cup.

However in the 12-day shoot which ended Saturday, Canada's 22-man team won four first prizes and placed in six other competitions.

Maj. A. B. Kinnier-Wilson, 35, a Harley Street doctor formerly of the Royal Army Medical Corps, won the Queen's Prize of 250 guineas. He scored 277 out of a possible 300.

South Africa won the Kolapore prize, shooting 381 at 500 yards and

370 at 600 yards, a total of 1,123 points out of a possible 1,200. Canada came third with a total of 1,106.

Best Canadian in the individual shoot was Capt. G. J. Gamble of Winnipeg who scored 267 to place 12th.

Final scores and positions of the other Canadians in the individual shoot were: Maj. T. W. Hall, New Westminster, B. C., 262, 43rd; Maj. W. J. Strachan Canadian attaché at Stockholm not a member of the official team, 260, 50th; Sqdn. Ldr. D. Reynolds, Ottawa, 260, 53rd; Wing Cmdr. A. G. Gordon, Ottawa, 255, 68th; Sgt. C. Wilson, Ottawa, 254, 74th; P.O. K. S. Fox, Verdun, Que., 253, 80th.

"Really tough" conditions beat the seven Canadians left in the "Queen's Hundred."

After the shoot, Fox said: "The mirage was really tough—the target appeared to jump up and down. That and the changing wind made conditions extremely difficult."

The Queen's Prize was presented by Earl Alexander, Britain's Defence Minister.

He said he was "extremely pleased to see my friends, the Canadians. I came over here on leave last year from Canada and watched them shoot and win."

Last year's prize winner was Lieut. Gilmour Boa of Toronto who this year failed to qualify for the "Queen's Hundred," in itself an Empire-wide badge of distinction with the service rifle.

Canada's victory last year in the Kolapore was the first since 1938. Canada's score then was 1,120.

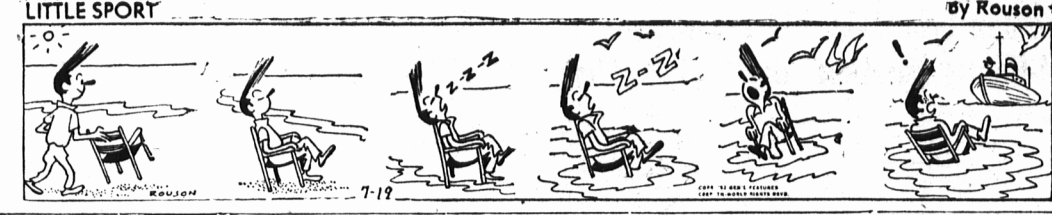

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Four Track And Field Records Fall As 1952 Olympic Games Open

HELSINKI, July 20.—(CP)—Four track and field records fell today as the 1952 Olympic Games swung into activity on most fronts.

Two of the record-smashers were Americans, one a Czech and the other a big-muscled Russian girl.

Emil Zatopek, perhaps the greatest distance runner in the world and certainly the most ungainly, successfully defended his 10,000-metre championship, blazing to a thrilling victory in Helsinki's sun-baked Olympic Stadium.

The mark of 29:17 by the Czechoslovakian army major bettered the former record of 29:59.6 he made in London in 1948.

Walt Davis, Texas cowboy who was a childhood victim of polio, cracked the high jump record of six feet, 7.93 inches with a mark of six feet, 8.32 inches—20.4 metres.

Johnny Palmer Wins Canadian Golf Ch'ship

WINNIPEG, July 20.—(CP)—Johnny Palmer, a deliberate golfer with nerves of iron, ran away with the \$15,000 Canadian open golf championship Saturday by shooting a six-under-par 66 for a record-breaking medal score of 263 in the 72-hole competition.

The 34-year-old native of Bad-N, N. C., lopped 25 strokes off par for the St. Charles Golf and Country Club course in the lowest four consecutive rounds in the 43 years the Canadian open has been played.

He won the \$3,000 first prize money and the Seagram gold cup by 11 strokes. He lopped five strokes off the previous Canadian open record of 288, shot in 1947 by Bobby Locke of South Africa. Locke was 16 strokes under par for the par-71 Toronto Scarboro course. St. Charles is par 72.

Freddy Haas, Jr. of New Orleans put on a closing burst to shoot a 68 for 274 and a second-place tie with blonde Dick Mayer from St. Petersburg, Fla., who finished with a 68. Each won \$1,350.

Three United States golfers shared fourth place with 275—Doug Ford of Harrison, N. Y.; Al Sinnerman of Portland, Ore.; and Skee Riegel of Tulsa. They split \$2,500.
