

New Head Of Canadian Shell Discusses Business Details

In business there is no real substitute for people getting together, says Vernes F. Grafstrom, recently appointed president of Canadian Shell Ltd.

This is the reason he spends many days of the year away from his Toronto head office in London, Holland, the United States, the Caribbean and elsewhere.

His philosophy is perhaps inevitable in the world-wide Royal Dutch-Shell group, an organization so far-flung and intricate that people often wonder how its various parts keep acquainted.

As president of Canadian Shell Mr. Grafstrom heads the company which, since 1953, has been the holding concern for the bulk of the group's interests in the Western Hemisphere. Under its corporate cape come about 55 subsidiaries, including Shell Oil Company of Canada Limited, a new outlet for Canadian crude when it goes into operation in 1963.

tion matters; dictated a number of letters; and approved a few expense accounts."

STOCK UNAVAILABLE

One of the corporate reorganization matters under continuing consideration is whether or not Shell Oil of Canada will make its shares available to the Canadian public.

"We would like to see this done," Mr. Grafstrom said, "and we are studying ways in which it might be achieved. It is a tremendously complicated problem, however, because of tax and other complications involved in changes in corporate structure."

One of the reasons for creating Canadian Shell was the vast amount of financing being done for the various companies of the Western Hemisphere. Part of this is nearly \$300,000,000 invested by the Shell group in Canada in the last 10 years—not including the cost of the \$300,000,000 refinery at Oakville, near Toronto, a new outlet for Canadian crude when it goes into operation in 1963.

PRACTISED LAW

Mr. Grafstrom, born at North Branch, Minn., the son of Petras and Sigrid Grafstrom, was educated at Maralester College, St. Paul, and the University of Minnesota, where he took his law degree in 1939. He later practised in New York and served with the U.S. Navy in the United States and Pacific during the war.

He joined the Shell organization in New York in 1948 and took part in the work that led to formation of Canadian Shell in 1953.

He joined Canadian Shell in 1953 as vice-president and secretary and became president at the beginning of this year on the retirement of Ian Davidson, president since 1957.

In 1940 he married Maria Lucille Hanscome. They have four children, Victoria, Erik, Karl and Emily.

McGREGOR DIES

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—W. Donald McGregor, O.B.E., 78, for more than half a century one of the city's leading business men and community servants, died Thursday night. Funeral will be held from St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Saturday at 3 p.m. Burial will be in Windsor Grove Cemetery.

"Don" as Mr. McGregor was familiarly known, was awarded the Order of the British Empire for distinguished leadership during the Second World War in organizing and directing the various victory loans in this area. He was born in Winnipeg

BUSY DAY

The various companies run their own operations and Canadian Shell comes into the picture only in high echelons and in such matters as finance, corporate arrangements and advisory and liaison services.

In Canadian Shell itself, Mr. Grafstrom heads a staff of nearly 90, including experts in finance, law, taxes and the many things that make up an oil industry. They are drawn from various parts of the Shell group and, like Mr. Grafstrom, are on the move much of the time.

Asked during a mid-afternoon interview what he had done so far that day, Mr. Grafstrom replied:

"Well, I talked to people in London and New York by telephone several times; read a large pile of incoming cables, letters and memoranda, acting on them as appropriate; approved several outgoing cables; attended a staff meeting; attended a directors' meeting of Shell Oil of Canada; spent an hour on corporate reorganization at Halifax, spent the weekend at his home in Borden.

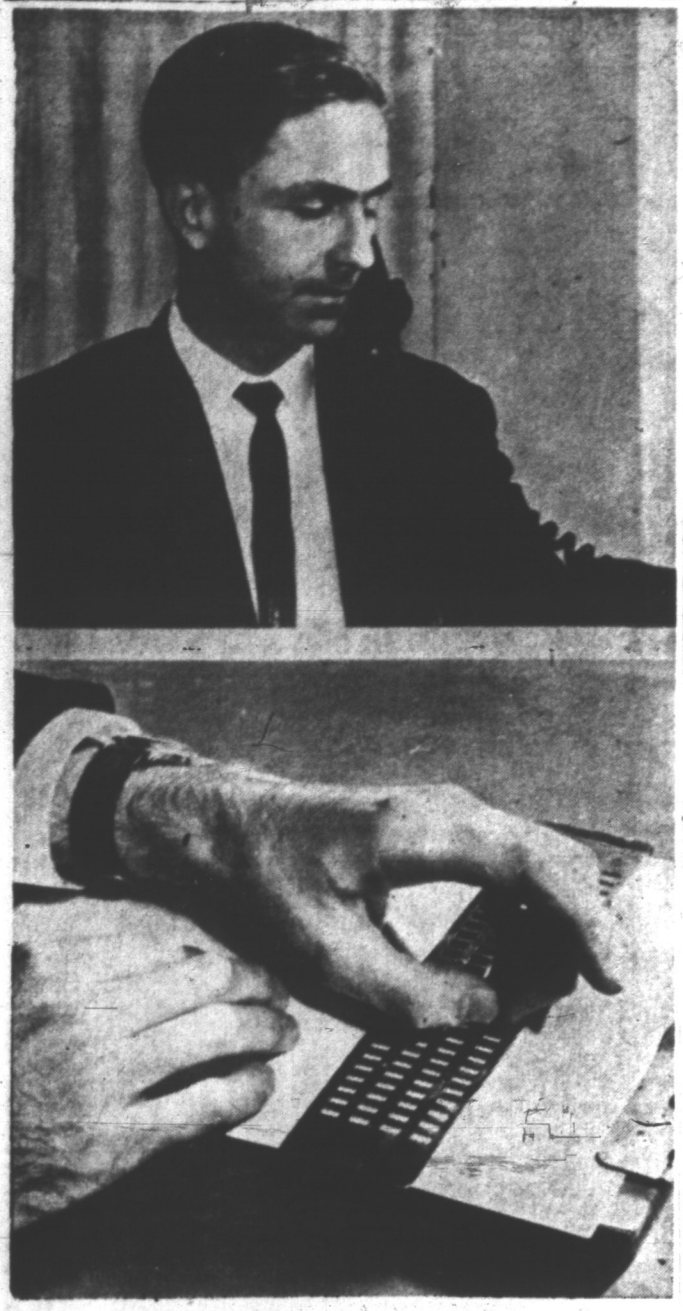

Right Use of the Sabbath

ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Scripture—Exodus 20:8-11; Mark 2:23-3:6; Luke 4:16-20, 31-40; Nehemiah 13:15-22

God instructed the people to rest on the seventh day of the week, keeping it a holy day for Him Later, Christ's disciples were criticized by the Pharisees for picking wheat on their journey on the Sabbath. — Exodus 20:8-11; Mark 2:23.

Christ rebuked the Pharisees, pointing out that the Sabbath rules were made for man, so he could worship God more fully; man's needs superceded the rules, as illustrated by David's eating of the showbread when he was hungry.—Mark 2:25-28.

Later in a synagogue Christ found a man with a withered hand defying the critical, rule-conscious Pharisees. Christ used his power to heal the cripple on the Sabbath. Doing good is man's most important job. — Mark 3:1-6.

Unlike these examples of need on the Sabbath, Nehemiah finds the Jerusalem Jews using the Sabbath with Jewish commercialism. To end it, he closes the gates of the city on the Sabbath.—Nehemiah 13:15-22.

Gen. E. Walker Becomes U.S. Right-Wingers' Hero

To many ultra-conservative Americans, Gen. Edwin A. Walker— who resigned from the army after a row over his troop indoctrination program — has become a hero. This second of four stores on the American right wing provides a close-up of the controversial general.

NEW YORK (AP) — Gen. Edwin A. Walker is a deeply disturbed man.

He is disturbed about loyalty in the United States government, about coexistence with the Communists, about some rulings of the U.S. Supreme Court, about several "policy decisions" in foreign relations, about the position of the United States vis-a-vis the United Nations, about actions of the late secretary-general Dag Hammarskjold, and especially about the "media," meaning American newspapers, radio and television.

Discussing this last point during an interview with this reporter, he asked:

"Doesn't anyone ever say anything good for America? You never hear it in Europe."

Earlier in a speech, he said: "The image of America, as I have seen it in the Far East and the West, is distorted and grotesque — a picture of corruption, immorality and mater-

ialism. This kind of propaganda, combined with censorship, has hastened our retreat from victory through 16 years."

Walker's ideas, in some respects, closely parallel those of the recently formed groups on the far right. The transcript of the army investigation of his conduct as a commander in Germany quotes him as saying he joined the John Birch Society in 1959 but never attended another of its meetings.
