Another season of National Football League action begins on CBC-TV Sunday, Sept. 11. Following is a partial schedule of games to be carried. All times are Eastern.

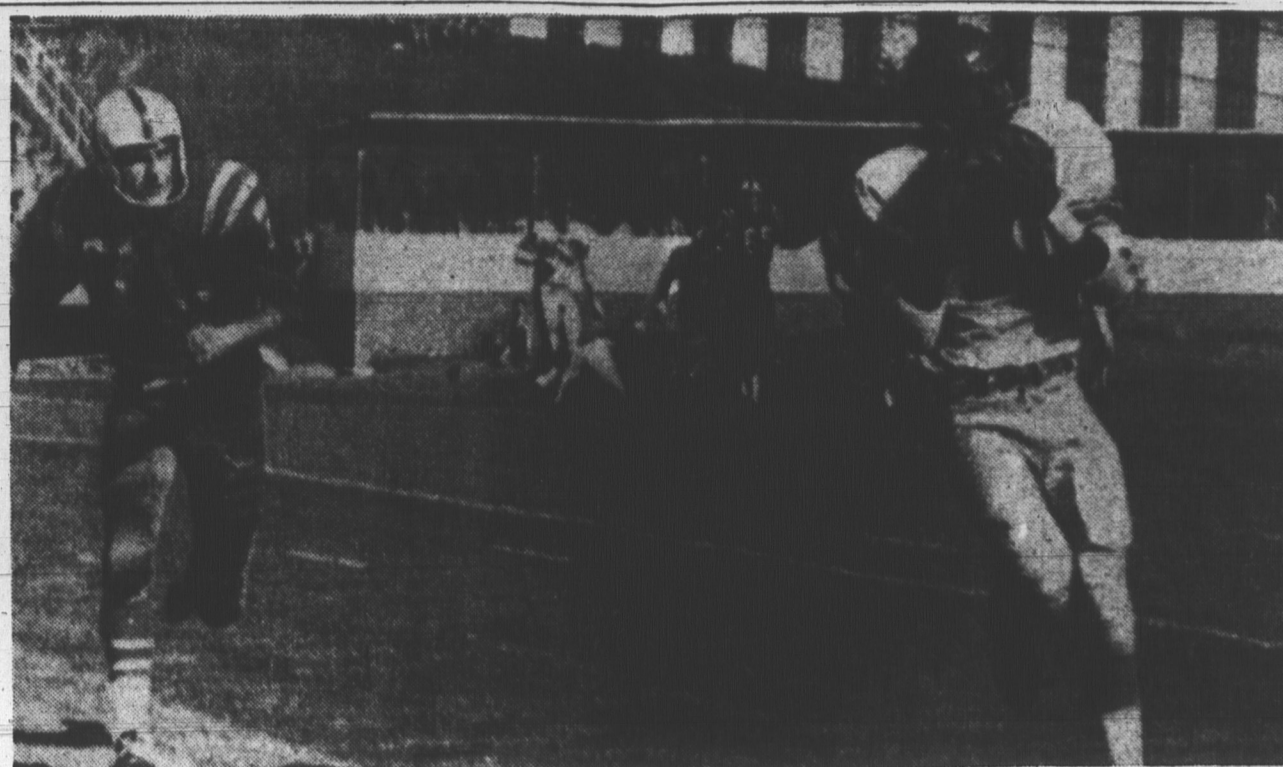

OTTAWA TIGER-CATS

HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats moved into a tie for first place in the Eastern Football Conference by defeating Ottawa Rough Riders 16-12 Monday, coming from behind with an unconverted touchdown by Bobby Kuntz in the fourth quarter before a record Hamilton crowd of 29,003.

The result left both clubs with three victories and one defeat. They meet again Saturday in Ottawa.

Kuntz's touchdown, on a dive over the line from the Ottawa one-yard line, erased a 12-10 lead the Riders took into the third quarter.

The Tiger-Cats also got a touchdown from Joe Zuger, who played most of the game at quarterback after returning from a three-week layoff caused by a cracked rib. Zuger's touchdown came on a four-yard run in the second quarter.

Zuger also kicked two 45-yard singles, the first against the wind in the opening quarter and the second with the wind in the second quarter.

Place kicker Don Sutherland added two more points on singles when field goal attempts from 47 and 33 yards fell wide in the second quarter.

Whit Tucker scored Ottawa's touchdown in the third quarter on a 12-yard pass from Russ Jackson. Moe Racine converted and kicked a 47-yard field goal in the second quarter. Ottawa's remaining points came on a safety touch in the third quarter when tackle Bob Brown nailed Zuger behind the Hamilton goal-line.

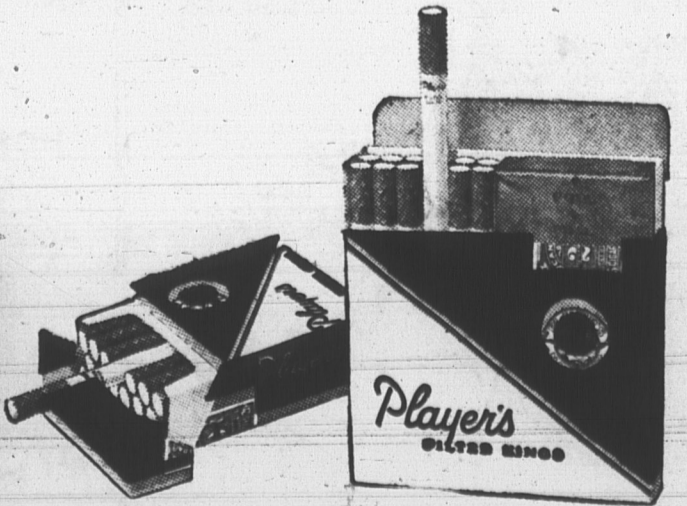
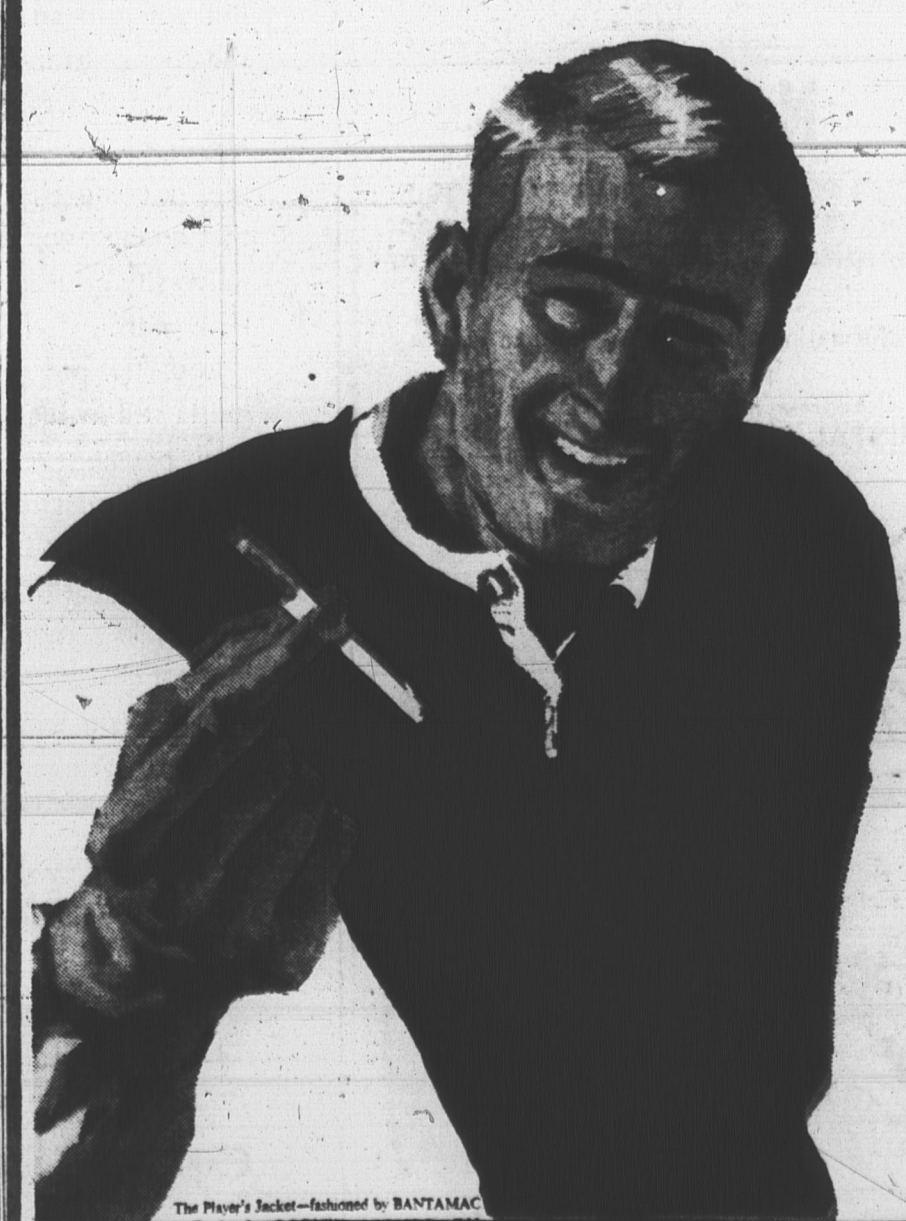
