THE SIEGE OF WEPENER RAISED

BOERS REPORTED TO HAVE LEFT ROUXVILLE.

Lord Roberts' Net Spread for the Commandos.

The People of Canada Thanked for their Timely and Generous Gifts—Another Canadian Dies of Enteric Fever—Movements of Strathcona's Horse.

LORD ROBERTS' THANKS.

OTTAWA, April 17.—The Governor General has received the following from Lord Roberts:

BLOEMFONTEIN, April 16.—Please thank the people of Canada, on behalf of myself, the troops and Colonel Ryerson for their generous and timely gifts just received.

A cable received from Lt.-Col. Otter says: "Private W. S. Blight, of the Queen's Own Rifles, died at Bloemfontein on the 15th inst., of enteric fever."

SIEGE OF WEPENER RAISED.

LONDON, April 17.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of The Telegraph, in a despatch yesterday, says: The Boers have raised the siege of Wepener and have left Rouxville.

The majority of them have, undoubtedly, retired north, with the exception of a body of about 6,000 now reported to be going toward Bethulie.

The correspondent of The Telegraph at Ladysmith, April 16th, says: "The Boers are down again at Dewdrop, west of Ladysmith."

STRATHCONA'S HORSE.

MONTREAL, April 17.—Strathcona's Horse will remain a Cape Town for a fortnight.

OVER THE FIELD.

LONDON, April 17, 4.15 a. m.—Lord Roberts has spread his net far and wide to catch the adventurous commandos that have been making mischief in the South eastern part of the State.

The net has not yet been drawn in, but at the headquarters of Lord Roberts an impression exists that the power of the Boers is decreasing.

A News correspondent has them fleeing to the southeast. The Standard's correspondent reports them fleeing northward.

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent says that some are going north and others south. While the Post's representative says: It is not known what the Boers are doing.

Evidently the feeling at Bloemfontein is that the dispositions of Lord Roberts are such as to enable him to concentrate a large force rapidly at any point.

The Boers, being aware of this, are presumed to be thinking now chiefly of retreat.

The investment of Wepener, according to a despatch from Bloemfontein has absolutely been abandoned.

According to a Bethany despatch, Boers are unable to retreat northward because the British strongly hold all the roads.

Deverse reports come from Natal, one asserting that the Boers have retreated beyond the Biggarsburg range and another that some are close to Ladysmith.

London waits confidently for almost an immediate announcement of news favorable to the British. Distrust exists, however, as to any rapid continuous advance

toward Pretoria, chiefly on account of lack of horses.

RELIGIOUS SOCIETIES

In The Roman Catholic Church Not To Take Part in Politics.

PARIS, April 17.—The Rome correspondent of Le Temps, in a despatch that has almost official significance, says: "The Papal decision, prohibiting the Assumptionists from continuing the editorial management of La Croix, was arrived at after a solemn conclave of the Bishops and Cardinals.

Hereafter no religious congregation will be permitted to take any part in politics. This decision is binding upon Catholics all over the world, including the American Paulists.

—It is stated that the liberals have an "imperial policy." This is incorrect. The St. John Sun truly says that all they have ever had is an election policy, and they have a new one every time.

—A friend informs us that a few days ago he received letters, one from Rome, Italy, the other from Lake Bennett on the route from Skagway to Dawson in the Klondike, written on the same day, the 25th March, both containing comments on the weather prevailing in these places. From Rome the comment is "just think we have had a hail storm here in Rome on the 24th of March. The lumps of hail were upwards of a quarter of an inch through and enough fell to make the ground white."

So much for sunny Italy. Here is what is said about the weather at Bennett, at the southern boundary of the Yukon Territory:

"I don't think I ever experienced such perfect weather as is prevailing here now. It is simply delightful, but of course may not last long."

SIR,—I see, by the last issue of THE WEEKLY EXAMINER that the Legislature is prorogued until the 23rd April, which probably means that we are not going to have any session this spring. Could you or your correspondent "Constitutionalist" answer the following questions:

Does not our Constitution demand that there shall be a session of Parliament every year?

What position would Lieutenant Governor McIntyre be in if he failed to call the Legislature within the time prescribed by the Constitution?

Would he not be liable to be impeached? Are not all the official acts of Attorney-General McKinnon illegal and unconstitutional?

Would not all the official acts of the present Executive Council be illegal and unconstitutional after the term for calling the Legislature had expired?

Would not all contracts entered into by them be liable to be cancelled by our incoming government?

Would they not be liable, in their private and personal capacity, for all moneys illegally or unconstitutionally spent by them? Or could they shield themselves behind the dishonest and dishonorable plea that it was only a breach of trust?

I firmly believe that we have not one man in our present executive (neither head nor tail) who understands Parliamentary usages sufficiently to carry on the Government of this country constitutionally.
