Foundered near Bona—Eleven Persons Drowned.

LONDON, Dec 6.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that France has made demands at Nankin that are equivalent to the alienation of a valuable portion of the Yang Tse valley.

The Viceroy of Nankin stoutly refuses to accede.

ALGIERS, Dec. 6.—The French steamer Algerois has foundered near Bona, a sea port of Algiers, eleven persons were drowned.

The New Stamps.

OTTAWA, Dec 6.—The two cent imperial stamp will be issued at once. It can be used by purchasers in place of the ordinary two cent stamp, but the penny imperial rate does not come into effect until Christmas.

End of a Trial.

NAPANEE, Dec 5.—The trial of Ponton and Meekie, on a charge of robbing the Dominion bank here of \$40,000 on August 27th 1897, is ended. The jury was unable to agree on a verdict in the case of Ponton, but found Meekie guilty, and he was sentenced to ten years in Kingston Penitentiary. Ponton was released on \$10,000 bail, pending a new trial. The feeling in Napanee is strongly in Ponton's favor.

The Portland's Victims.

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—All the bodies of the victims of the Portland disaster thus far recovered, have been identified—25 in all. The two bodies brought up from the Cape yesterday, which up to last night had not been recognized, were to day given in charge of friends, they have proved identification. These bodies have been at the North Street morgue.

Rochefort Again

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Mr. Henry Rochefort editor of Intransigent having declared in that paper that General Horace Porter, United States Ambassador to France recently said England has financed the Dreyfus syndicate with a view of dividing and weakening France, Gen Porter, on being shown the paper replied that M. Bochefer's statement was a fabrication pure and simple.

Post Office Circulars

OTTAWA, Dec 4.—A circular has been sent by the post office department to all postmasters advising them that the imperial penny postage stamps are ready and will be applied for as the "two cent imperial stamp," so as to distinguish it from the ordinary two cent stamp now in use. Imperial penny postage will be available forthwith to the extent of its value for the prepayment of postage on all classes of mail matter to all destinations, whether domestic, British or foreign. The stamp may be sold as soon as received. The same circular also calls attention to the fact that no parcel can be sent from Canada to any other country by parcel post unless it bears a customs declaration setting forth the contents and value.

The Labrador

HALIFAX, Dec 5.—The Dominion Line steamer Labrador, Capt Erkie, from Liverpool and Moville with weekly mails and passengers, arrived in port at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, making her first visit of the season. The steamer met with fair weather on the passage, a heavy sea, but no storm, being encountered. Her average speed was 300 miles, but from noon Saturday to noon today she covered 340 miles. She brought 27 cabin, 31 second cabin and passengers 129 steerage. With the exception of four cabin and about 25 steerage, all landed here.

A Valuable Concession.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily News says: "It is officially announced that the Spanish peace commissioners have secured a concession granting Spain commercial advantages in the Philippines for ten years. An effort will be made to obtain a similar concession in the Antilles."

Peace Commission.

PARIS, Dec. 5.—The United State and Spanish peace commission held private sessions yesterday. Afterwards representatives of both bodies predicted confidently that the treaty would be signed within a week, unless unforeseen complications arose. The American commissioners assert that there is no foundation for the reports circulated in the United States and cabled back here that President McKinley has forwarded to the American Commissioners fresh instructions to insist unyieldingly upon a coaling base in the Carolines, and that the Spaniards are endeavouring to renew their opposition to a cession of the Philippines. Both commissions recognize that the latter question is settled.

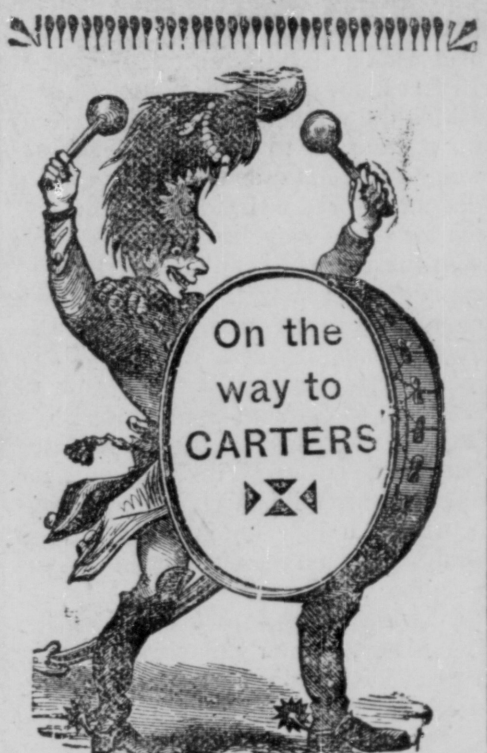
Philips vs Gillis—Action of ejectment submitted to the Court in a special case. Wm. Dodd, as to the real estate in question, died intestate, leaving him surviving one brother, two sisters, one nephew and two grand nephews—his father also being dead.

The property was sold to one Gillis. One of the grand nephews of Wm Dodd, brought an action of ejectment against the said Gillis who had gone into possession, and the matter was submitted to the court by way of a special case.

The question involved is whether the grand-nephew is under the statute, and in the present case, one of the next of kin of the late William Dodd.

The court gave an unanimous judgment that the plaintiff was not entitled to recover and judgment was entered for defendant. W S Stewart Q C, for plaintiff F L Hazard, Q C, for defendant.

THE OPERA SEASON OPENS

Besides, the trip from Point Du Cne to Summerside was a very rough one, and all the members of the company suffered more or less—generally more—from sea sickness. It was under circumstances such these that the Robinson company made their first appearance before a Charlottetown audience, and, all things considered, they made a capital impression. For to-night's entertainment they will present Said Pasha, and after a good rest and with more time to attend to details a rendering as nearly faultless as possible may be expected.

The performance of last evening developed the fact that the company is made up of good singers and clever actors and actresses, and they will, no doubt, be well patronized during the remainder of their season. The part of Fra Diavolo was well taken by Mr Frank D Nelson; and Mr Charles N Holmes, as Lorenzo, also sang and acted his part cleverly. Minnie Jarbeau, the prima donna of the company, gave a capital rendering of the part of Zerlina. The other characters were in competent hands; Messrs Young and Oakley furnishing much amusement as the "brave" followers of the bandit chief. An exceedingly pleasing feature of the performance was the singing of the sextette at the close of the second act, and the audience was so delighted that a curtain call was insisted upon.
