

Canada Hopes For Progress At New Tariff Conference

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada hopes the Kennedy Round of tariff negotiations resuming in Geneva next month will accomplish at least enough to avoid being lagged a failure.

Such a modest minimum should prevent any post round protectionist reaction among the members of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

An official close to the talks says it could also open up free trade possibilities in a number of economic sectors.

In more than three years the

round has turned up only tentative and limited offers of tariff reductions by GATT members. Only 10 months remain until President Johnson loses the tariff cutting powers which set the round going when they were conferred by the U.S. Congress in 1962.

The holdup has been the wait for European Common Market countries to settle their own prices and subsidies for agricultural products.

Their agreement in July made possible a set of agricultural offers to Geneva, and they were tabled early this month.

SPEAK REDUCTION

The goal, sought most eagerly by the United States, Britain and the Scandinavian countries, is a 50 per cent reduction in both industrial and agricultural tariffs.

Common Market reluctance—particularly on the part of France—is certain to deny such a big cut in farm products and probably in other sectors.

Every country will reserve some products for continued protection. Agreements promise

to be especially tough in such industrial sectors as chemicals, pulp and paper, aluminum and steel.

Canada is one of four countries to win exclusion from bargaining on a 50-per-cent linear basis, because such cuts will help Canadian exports little, while opening Canada to a shower of new imported manufactured goods.

The four excepted countries are tabling specific tariff offers and bargaining on their terms.

NOT ENTHUSIASTIC

Having just established their own trade partners and stance, Common Market members are expected to be the least enthusiastic participants at Geneva.

Canada, too, has the appearance of being on the defensive because its own tariff structure is relatively high in comparison with the easy access its bulk commodities and foodstuffs gain in foreign markets.

"But in real substance," says a government source, "when you look at real terms at the trade that is going to result, we're probably being as forthcoming as anyone."

Disappointment at Geneva would be expected to spur the Liberal government's interest in reciprocal free trade agreements with the United States.

Poll Of Officers Is Urged On Forces Unification Issue

OTTAWA (CP)—Opposition Leader Diefenbaker said here armed forces traditions cannot be swept aside by a simple edict of a minister intent on glorifying his own image.

He suggested at a press conference that a poll be taken among all officers and men in the forces to determine whether they support unification of the services.

He said Canadians have been surprised and shocked to find out that witnesses before the Commons defence committee had to alter their evidence to suit the "peculiar predilections" of Defence Minister Hellyer.

Mr. Diefenbaker said he had been inclined to criticize the defence committee for not trying hard enough until he found out that evidence was being tailored to suit the demands of the defence department. No action on unification should be taken until

Parliament itself had acted on the matter.

The defence department had recently discovered that "you can't pull the pants off the navy without having some parliamentary approval."

RUSH HALTED

A headlines rush toward unification had started after Parliament had adjourned. This now had been halted.

Mr. Diefenbaker said he would like nothing better than to be a member of the defence committee to cross-examine one or two cabinet ministers.

He quoted Mr. Hellyer as saying last October in Halifax during the election campaign that "sailors will always be soldiers, soldiers will always be airmen."

He said it is detrimental to Parliament that anonymous individuals in the defence department are engaging in character assassination of retired senior officers.

Prime Minister Pearson should issue an order to William Lee, executive assistant to Mr. Hellyer, and to the defence minister, "in that order" to stop making camouflaged statements.

Mr. Diefenbaker also said he understands the armed forces will get a 14-per-cent pay increase Oct. 1.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

BIDDING QUIZ

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North East South West
1♥ 2♣ ?

What would you bid now with each of the following five hands?

1. ♠7 ♥K9653 ♦84 ♣AQ42
2. ♠Q974 ♥183 ♦KQ75 ♣AQ
3. ♠AKJ53 ♥J94 ♦96 ♣852
4. ♠A962 ♥62 ♦AK3 ♣10754
5. ♠A853 ♥Q9 ♦A642 ♣863

4. Four hearts. There is no doubt you can murder East at two clubs, but it is next to impossible for two clubs doubled to be the final contract. With 12 spades and 11 diamonds missing, you can feel sure that the opponents have a better trump suit than clubs.

It is better to bid four hearts than three because there is a good chance that the opponents can sacrifice profitably in spades or diamonds, and the jump to four is more apt to block out the save.

2. Three notrump. This is the easiest way of identifying the distribution and high-card point counts. Three notrump in this sequence shows 13 to 15 high-card points, notrump distribution and a double stopper in clubs. It is therefore a highly descriptive bid. If North has a hand unsuitable for notrump
