Eucharistic Congress In June Expected To Draw 10,000

A Eucharistic Congress will be held in the Diocese of Charlottetown on Sunday, June 28. It was announced this morning by Rev. Eugene Murray, chairman of the Diocesan Congress Committee and pastor at St. Theresa's. The one day event is aimed at bringing the Roman Catholics of the diocese together in prayer.

The date of the congress was originally set for June 21, but was advanced to June 28 so as not to conflict with the B. I. L. Graham Crusade.

The diocesan congresses are usually held every three years, but this one, scheduled for 1963, was set ahead to this year to fit into the Centennial celebra-

tions in the province. The congress is to be the Roman Catholic effort for the Diocese of Charlottetown in the religious events of the year. Father Murray said.

It will be held at St. Dunstan's University where a Eucharistic procession will take place around the grounds, climaxed by the celebration of Pontifical High Mass by Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, D.D., P.M., Bishop of Charlottetown.

MANY VISITORS
Upwards of 10,000 Catholics from all parts of the Island are expected to attend. It is also

expected that many visitors will be on hand.

The last congress in the diocese was held in June, 1959, also at St. Dunstan's University. Previous to that congresses had been held at such places as Indian River, Souris, St. Peter's Bay, Vernon River, Tignish, St. Andrew's, Miscouche, and North Rustico.

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Charlottetown Welcomes The Canadian Centenary Council

In 1964 the Province of Prince Edward Island is celebrating one of the most important dates in Canadian history—the 100th anniversary of the first Confederation Conference of Canada.

The high adventure of Confederation was embarked upon in Charlottetown on September 1, 1864. Top statesmen from Upper and Lower Canada joined with leaders from Canada's seaside colonies, who were actually gathered to discuss Maritime Union, and steered the deliberations in the direction of a broader union. The proposal resulted in the joining, three years later, of all British North American colonies into one vast Federal entity stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean. Thus was born the Dominion of Canada.

On a bronze mural in historic Confederation Chamber in Charlottetown the spirit of the Fathers of Confederation meeting is captured by the following phrase inscribed thereon: "PROVIDENCE BEING THEIR GUIDE THEY BULDDED BETTER THAN THEY KNEW"

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
