Commission Patrol Vessel On Wednesday

OTTAWA (CP) — The navy will commission the first of four bird-class coastal patrol vessels, the Loon, at Toronto Wednesday, naval headquarters announced Monday.

The Loon, built by Taylor Boat Works, Toronto, has a displacement of 65 tons, is 92 feet long and has a 17-foot beam. It has two 600 horsepower diesel engines and a top speed of 14 knots. It was built chiefly of wood and aluminum.

The vessel will be commissioned under command of Lieut. A.J. Norman of Halifax and will sail for the east coast port that will be its headquarters soon after the ceremony.

The three other vessels of the Loon's class are being built at Midland, Orillia and Penetanguishene, Ont. They are scheduled to be completed in the spring.

Tourist Publicity Pays Off, 10th Annual Ottawa Conference Is Informed

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal-provincial tourist conference was told Monday that for every dollar spent on advertising her vacation playgrounds, Canada gets back an estimated 8.9 tourist dollars.

The estimate was given to the opening session of the 10th tourist conference by D. Leo Dolan, head of the Canadian travel bureau. He said the bureau plans to spend between \$700,000 and \$800,000 on advertising in 1956 and to expand its free information service.

Resources Minister Lesage opened the conference with an address welcoming the delegates from every province. He said the keynote of the meeting should be the attraction of more Canadians to see their own country first.

Foreign visitors to Canada increased this year, spending some \$300,000,000 in this country. But, said the minister, that was not enough when one considered that American tourists alone are estimated to have spent \$1,500,000,000 on tourist activities all over the world this year.

While the number of Americans visiting Canada increased, so did the number of Canadian tourists going abroad. He expected Canada's tourist dollar deficit—the difference between what foreigners spent in Canada and what Canadians spent abroad—would be bigger than ever this year.

All Canadian agencies should concentrate not only on attracting the American tourist, but on attracting Canadians to see their own country. DISPUTE DISCOVERY HONORS
Georges Leveille, director of Quebec's publicity department, said 1958 would mark the 250th anniversary of the discovery of Canada. He was considering a plan to have a replica of the ship Jacques Cartier used in the discovery placed at Quebec as a floating museum of Canadian historical data.

Earl Clark, director of industrial and tourist promotion for Nova Scotia, said John Cabot discovered the first landfill off Cape Breton. O. L. Vardy, director of Newfoundland's tourist office, interjected that Canada was first discovered in Newfoundland 458 years ago.

Former School Principal Dies In His 91st Year

Mr. James Landrigan, well-known former teacher and principal of Queen Square School, Charlottetown, died at the Charlottetown Hospital, in his ninety-first year, on Sunday last. He was born at Covehead, Prince Edward Island, July 27, 1865, the eldest son of the late David Landrigan and Matilda Murphy.

He was educated at Covehead School and Prince of Wales College, graduating in 1882, the only surviving member of this graduating class being Dr. H. H. Shaw, Charlottetown. Mr. Landrigan then taught school at Gowan Brae, Souris, Miscouche and Tignish. In 1894 he married Ann Mullaugh of Gowan Brae. He then taught school in Kensington for two years before becoming Principal of Queen Square School in 1896. This position he held with marked ability for twenty years.

After this he became the first manager of the Government School Supply. After several years in that position, Mr. Landrigan retired
