SPAIN AND CUBA.

The Insurgents Surrendering.

Commanding Officers Surrender Their Arms.

WHAT WILL MCKINLAY DO ABOUT IT?

The London Times Opinion.

HAVANA, Jan. 21.—The Spanish authorities report that the insurgent general Maso Para, with forces under his command, Lieut.-Col. Augustine Fena and Lieut.-Col. Jose Carmon Hernandez, Majors Feliciano, Quesdo, Saterino, Leon and Nictorano Gomez with six other officers and a hundred and ten privates, well armed and well supplied with ammunition have surrendered at Novento to the Spanish General Aguirre.

The insurgents are said to have formed in line and delivered up their arms according to the ordinance shouting "Long life Spain."

During the last ten days the insurgents are said to have lost 115 killed and 35 taken prisoners with 249 remington rifles.

In addition to those who surrendered with General Juan Maso Para, according to the Spanish authorities, fifty-six other armed men have surrendered. Among them, two Lieut.-Colonels and three other officers.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The Spanish Minister here has received a cablegram from General Blanco confirming the preceding despatch.

Times on The Situation.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Times in an editorial on Mr. Hill's speech in the House of Representatives says: We assume that President McKinley does not wish his hand to be forced by the opposite party. He does not want war with Spain, because his heart is set upon promoting the economical and commercial development of the United States. Yet it remains doubtful whether he will prove strong enough to resist the pressure brought to bear upon him. One of the usual kaleidoscopic changes in American politics has just been effected. The Cuban question is evidently much graver than it was two days ago, and the government is not any stronger. An accident may precipitate any thing.

Drummond County Railway.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—It is stated that there will be no Drummond County Railway proposition at the coming session of parliament, but that the Government will revoke the amount voted for that purpose in supplementary estimates of last year.

A Steamer Goes Down.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Leith steamer Herbert foundered off Cunn's Island, Ireland yesterday. Seven were drowned.

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 19.—The latest reports from the Placentia Bay frozen herring fishery are that the American fleet of forty vessels is likely to lead this week, owing to severe frost, which will practically conclude the fishing this year.

ALEX, Jan. 19.—The German warships Deutschland and Gefion, from Kiel for China, have arrived here. Prince Henry of Prussia, who commands the squadron, has played polo with the British officers stationed here who are entertaining him lavishly. The squadron will proceed on Thursday.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—At a banquet given last night to General Wolsley, Commander-in-Chief, he refuted what he called pessimistic rumors current about the army. He declared that if England declared war she could have two of the finest and most fully equipped army corps in readiness for any British port before ships could be prepared to embark them.

BOSTON, Jan. 18.—At the annual meeting of the Boston chamber of commerce, yesterday, resolutions favoring reciprocity with Canada were unanimously adopted.

CAIRO, Jan. 18.—The native troops from Kassala have captured another Dervish outpost, Mugalia, west of Kassala.

ANNAPOLIS, Jan. 19.—The question as to the advisability of the town operating their own electric light system was voted on today. As it was conceded that there would be a majority against it, there was a very small vote. Sixty-three said "no," and thirty-five "yes."

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—Recruiting for the mounted police has re-commenced at Regina. While the strength of the force in the territories will be limited to 500, the Yukon force, of 250, to be considered independent, brings the number back to the old figures, but unfortunately, the cream of the force has been allowed to go during the past 18 months.

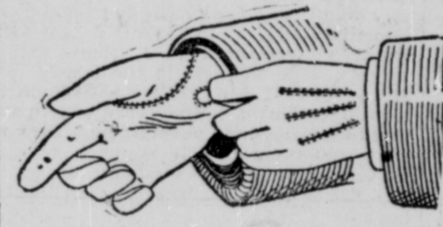
