ST. PETER'S CONCERT.

It has come to be a matter of course that a St. Peter's Church concert is an overcrowded affair. We don't mean the programme—that is generally so good that it is voted too short—but the concert hall. That the committee did well in securing a larger hall was proved last night in the Philharmonic Hall; for not only was there no sitting nor standing gallery had to be thrown open. The Master of the Halls was, unfortunately, not able to appear but judging from the laughter and applause which greeted the comic pieces, and the appreciative hearing given music and recitations, that was the first and last of their disappointments.

The two glees were a real treat. Why cannot we have a resurrection of the Society which used its home in this hall a few years ago? All music lovers would rally to its support. Mr. Hunt had a difficult task to perform, but carried it through with conscientious exactitude. Very few vocalists would dare to attempt such a piece of music before a Charlottetown audience, nor would he be listened to if he did, as he was.

Miss Benoit sang the "Flower Girl" as sweetly as could be. Her powers as a vocalist are of a high order, and her voice is being well cultivated. Mr. Clout Hill was in excellent voice in a song well in his selection from Tosti. He is one of the singers whom Charlottetown will gladly hear again.

The fantasia from "Olivette," by Miss Inclair and Prof. Earle, reminds us that we want to see "Olivette" or something equally good on the boards this winter. Miss Gertrude Davies recited so well that half the audience forgot that they had heard her before in the same piece and the other half were so delighted that it would have made no difference anyway.

Mr. Armand's readings are never tiresome, and his rendition of one of the most powerful scenes in Ivanhoe was excellent. Mr. Ballman made a decided hit in telling about the new patent adjustable blind-roller skirt. Prof. Vinnicombe played the clarinet as only Prof. Vinnicombe can do it. Miss M. Moore sang exceedingly well a pretty love-song. She, too, is a vocalist whom Charlottetown will always listen to with pleasure. The comic quartet, "Japanese Song" and "Phantom Band," brought the house down; and Master C. Earle did it again with the ever new "Fogarty's Cake,"—for the crust it was nailed on with glue.

A word of warning at the end: There is no doubt that the room was dangerously crowded. Better take a larger one next time. The committee, who are to be congratulated upon the excellence of the entertainment as a whole, have to thank Mr. C. P. Fletcher for his piano so kindly lent.

WHO IS ALEXANDER RAMSAY?

A Portland, Me., despatch says: Only the arrival of the police prevented a murder on board the fishing schooner George W. Pierce on Monday evening. All the crew had become intoxicated, and one sailor, Alexander Ramsay, was in a fighting mood. He entered a group of his fellows and attacked Thos. Hyde, who is from Boston. Hyde resisted and a brawl ensued. Ramsay was hit in the head by a beer bottle and fell to the floor of the vessel. Several severe gashes were cut in his skull, and the interior branch of the temporal artery was severed. The calls of "police" called three officers to the schooner, and Ramsay and Hyde were both arrested. Dr. Twichell was summoned and dressed Ramsay's wounds. Had medical aid not been given, Ramsay would have died to death. He now lies at the police station, but will probably recover. Ramsay is a large powerful man, while Hyde is only of average build. The former is from Prince Edward Island.

POTATOES IN BOSTON.—The Boston correspondent of the St. John Sun writes: Potatoes are arriving by water from the maritime provinces, the largest consignments coming from the Island province. The first cargo of the season arrived last Tuesday in the schooner Valiant from Alberton. Other cargoes have since arrived in the schooners Miletus, Cora L., and other vessels from Georgetown, P. E. I. Some potatoes are also arriving by car, but these mostly come from New Brunswick, close to the border, and St. John river counties.

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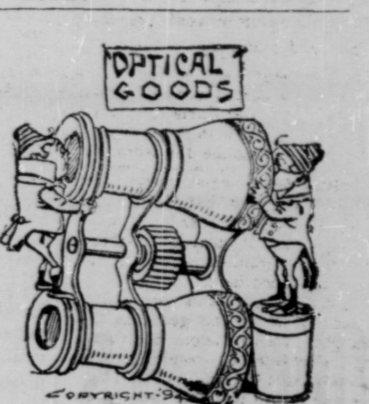
