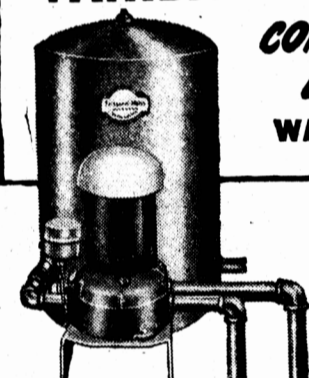

Farm Bldgs. At Caledonia Burned

Fire believed to have started from an overheated pipe on the second floor, destroyed the home and barns of Mr. Daniel Martin, Caledonia, about noon Tuesday. At the time Mr. and Mrs. Martin were absent at Kilmuir.

The courage and presence of mind of their thirteen-year-old son, John, was responsible in saving a quantity of household furnishings as well as three horses, five cows and other stock which were in the barns. After noticing the fire the young boy took charge directing his younger brother and sisters from the house. Then running to the barn he released the stock after which he returned to the house to remove furnishings. With feet blistered by the heat he continued until the flames and heat prevented him re-entering the house.

By this time the wind had carried the flames to the adjoining barns which were soon a mass of flames. Fortunately all farm machinery and wagons were outside at the time. The buildings were a total loss. There was no insurance. At home at the time besides John were his younger sisters Margaret and Mary, and another younger brother Ivan. More than 100 bushels of seed oats prepared for seeding and a quantity of fertilizer was lost in addition to the buildings, and the loss is a severe one to Mr. Martin.
