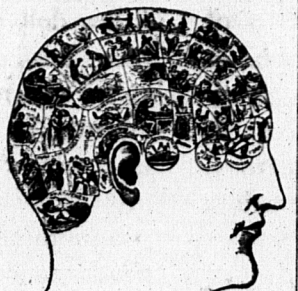

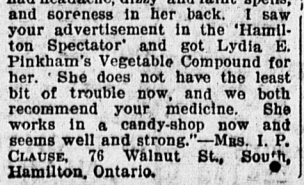

# LETTER FROM WALES

By W. L. COTTON

## Old Houses and Modern Methods— Interesting Walks and Drives in the Old Principality

One of the houses in Conway was built—so 'tis stated on a sign-board attached to it—in the year 1300. Until recent years it was a mere tavern; now it is a museum of articles of ancient manufacture, interesting to visitors of antiquarian tastes.

Much more pretentious and much more interesting in every way is "Plas Mawe" now tenanted by the "Royal Cambrian Academy of Art" and the receptacle of modern paintings and other works of art as well as of interesting relics of antiquity of which itself is one. It was built more than three centuries ago, and was for many years the Manor House of the Wynne family the greatest landholders in Wales. It was frequented by Queen Elizabeth, the Earl of Leicester and other grandees of the Elizabethan period. We visited it, of course. One of its most conspicuous features is the plaster decorations on the walls and ceilings. These were, it is stated, originally finished in correct heraldic colours, and were in a high degree, imposing when Queen Elizabeth stayed there. Now portraits and landscapes by modern painters—some of them of great artistic excellence—decorate the old walls that have looked down upon many a scene of royal festivity.

We climbed to the top of the highest tower of the "great mansion" and got a splendid view of the old town, its castle towers, walls and ancient battlements, the peaceful river at its side and the grand rural prospects in the distance. The grandeur and the beauty of the works of nature and of man were very impressive. I can well believe the statement that few spots in the Kingdom have more frequently given inspiration to poets and artists.

In successive days we went into the country round about, by bus and motor car, and again on foot. We visited "Brynnyppy" where Robert Harris, C. M. G., the Canadian artist, was born. "Crymmpri" where some of his ancestors lived, "Dwydyrych" where his father and mother lived when they were first married, "Golgorog," the seat of an extensive "Aluminium" factory drawing its raw material from Canada, "Lamberis Lake" where there is a very large slate quarry, "Crom-y-Glo," "Llanfairfach" and other spots, picturesquely named as they are picturesquely situated, and lunched in a hotel near the foot of "Snowdon" the summit of which was enveloped in cloud as we passed.

In passing we inspected the ruins of a grand old castle near "Deasymaris," in the Isle of Andsey and here, the second Sunday in July—July 9th is the date on which he is to take up his new pastorate at Milltown.

REV. G. M. YOUNG, METHODIST PASTOR GOES TO MILLTOWN

Rev. G. M. Young, who for the past five years has been pastor of the Fredericton Methodist Church, is to take over the pastorate at Milltown, N. B., following the 39th annual session of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference now meeting at Sackville.

Word to this effect has been received here and it is understood that Mr. Young's assignment to the Milltown church is included in the station sheet which is being sent out by the Stationing Committee of the Conference this afternoon. He will succeed at Milltown, Rev. Richard Opie, chairman of the St. Stephen district, who goes to St. Andrews, where Rev. Thomas Marshall has been acting for the past year.

Rev. Mr. Young has served for twenty eight years in the ministry of the Methodist Church and has been for some years one of the most prominent figures in the N. B. & P. E. I. Conference, of which he was elected president in 1918. He has been pastor of Centenary Church (St. John), Hampton, Chatham, Charlottetown (P. E. I.), Halifax (N. S.), St. Stephen and Campbellton. He was pastor at St. Stephen about fifteen years ago and therefore does not go to the Milltown Church as a stranger in the St. Stephen District.

While located in Fredericton Rev. Mr. Young has been active as chairman of the Fredericton Methodist District and also in connection with the work of the church in this city; he also has acted as chaplain of the Fredericton Curling Club and he and his family have made many friends

visited the church there still in good repair and still well attended and carefully put in order after the lapse of ten centuries. The small remains of "Trecastell" another centre of strength "in the good old days" were also seen. Then we passed over the "Menai Bridge" which when built nearly a hundred years ago was counted a marvel of engineering skill. Now it is insignificant when compared with the Quebec Bridge over our St. Lawrence. Yet its height, and its weight suspended in the air, are even now very impressive upon the nerves of the stranger passing over it.

After inspecting Carnarvon Castle, formerly a military stronghold at the head of Carnarvon Bay, and now a magnificent memorial of the men who lived in ages past, we motored through the lively old town of Bangor and the beautiful beach for bathing and summer resort at "Penmaenmawr."

The contrasts presented by things new and old in Wales are striking to the stranger. We stayed at the Castle Hotel in Conway, the walls of which are hundreds of years old and two feet thick; yet it is supplied with all the conveniences of modern life. A huxter of vegetables in Conway has a very small donkey hitched to his cart, yet there are "buses" and "charrabuses" and "autos" galore, hot to speak of—railways, steamships and aeroplanes, to carry on the business of the Welsh country. By the way we counted, yesterday, a fleet of six aeroplanes passing over the hills on the way from Dublin to London. Rocks protrude from the earth in all directions; yet nowhere have we seen a more luxuriant foliage, in the trees or a more general bloom of spring flowers. The heights in the passes among the hills compare not unfavorably with those of British Columbia. Yet on the low lands there are undulating landscapes as broad as those of Prince Edward Island.

The people generally, in the streets and in their houses, I noticed, speak the Celtic language of their forefathers. In the language of their bards of old they still sing and offer prayer when in church. Yet they are quite "upto date" in the use of the English language—speaking it with a decidedly more musical intonation than their Saxon confreres.

The week we spent in Wales was exceedingly pleasant. Every day was fine; and all things new and old were pleasant to the eye and good for mind and body.

### PUZZLES TO THE BLIND

The path of the teacher of the blind is beset with many difficulties, one of the greatest being the task of conveying to their mind some idea of the size, shape and features of birds and animals. In many cases, it is true models are used, but owing to their small size they are, to say the least, of doubtful advantage.

The ignorance of blind children is great, often grotesque. A teacher of a class may find that a child does not know whether a sheep or a cow is the larger, or he may even find that a hare has wings. However carefully they are told that a small model of a cow is only one fortieth the size of the real animal, more often than not they are unable to think of the animal as being any larger than the model and will stoop and describe something about the size of a kitten when asked to indicate the size of a cow. This arises from the fact that no standard of size, form, and texture, beyond those which they set up through handling—can exist for those who have never had the use of their eyes.

Even those who have had sight are found to lose their standards unless they are renewed from time to time by actual contact. An instance of this was noticed not long ago when a boy of about twelve recovered his sight after an operation and for several days following went about in a state of surprise and fear, for almost everything which he had not been in the habit of touching frequently differed considerably in size from
