

P.E.I. Bred Jersey Continues Production Records In N.B.

One of the good Jersey cows in the herd of Malcolm Mackay, Highlow Farm, Hampton, N. B. is River North Pansy 2nd. Pansy has recently completed another high record, this time as a 9 year old, completing almost 15,000 lbs. of milk and 882 lbs. of fat. This is her seventh record, giving her a total production of 90,045 lbs. of milk and 4,371 lbs. of fat. Twice she has been awarded a Ton of Gold certificate by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, and she wins a Gold Medal certificate for her last record, a 4,000 pound certificate, and her second Ton of Gold certificate, making three awards recently achieved.

She was bred by the well known Prince Edward Island Jersey breeder, Edison B. Mutch. Pansy 2nd is a daughter of the Gold and Silver Medal bull,

Brave Flora's Oscar, also bred by Edison Mutch. After winning several prizes in Canada, Oscar was sold to Vermont where he has been grand champion at the Vermont State Fair.

Pansy 2nd's dam is the famous Maid's Pansy, making her a full sister to the recently announced superior sire, Jester's Royal Dreamer, grand champion bull at the Royal Winter Fair in 1952, and winner of many championships in Canada and the United States.

The highest record made by River North Pansy 2nd was 854 lbs. of fat, a Canadian championship butterfat production in the herd of George MacMillan, Cornwall, P. E. I. The highest milk production was 17,671 lbs. of milk in 365 days. She has been awarded a total of four Gold Medal and Merit certificates.

Pleads Guilty In Money Case, Is Remanded

In Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday, a resident of Covehead appeared on four charges of failing to account for money received. The accused, who had previously been committed to the Supreme Court on another charge of fraud, pleaded guilty to all four charges. He was remanded for sentence by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet to September 12.

Charged with stealing chickens, the property of the Dominion Government, from the Experimental Farm, a resident of Charlottetown pleaded guilty to attempted theft. He was sentenced to serve 10 days in the Queens County Jail.

Another theft charge against a Charlottetown youth was withdrawn by the prosecution.

A resident of North Rustico who appeared on a charge of causing a disturbance by shouting and swearing in a public place, pleaded not guilty to the charge. The case was adjourned to September 5.

Will Probe Fire In Mine Buildings

BATHURST (CP) — Investigation of an early Wednesday mine fire near Bathurst is expected to be made by J.C. Dumbille, Toronto, vice-president of Nigadoo Mines Ltd.

The fire, of undetermined cause destroyed the pilot mill and headframe of the former Keymet Mine now owned by Nigadoo. It is near Petit Rocher and about 15 miles from Bathurst.

Expensive machinery in the 300-foot mill building was heavily damaged. An accurate assessment of the loss awaited arrival of company officials from Toronto.

The mine was closed in April and workmen have been removing some of the equipment.

The Petit Rocher Forestry Fire Brigade saved the office buildings, dry room and several smaller structures.

Artificial Radiation Used To Give Apples Rosier Look

MONTREAL (AP) — Artificial radiation has been used to give rosier cheeks to the tasty but slightly anaemic-looking Courtland apple.

The method may soon become an important tool in apple-breeding research, says Dr. C. J. Bishop, head of the Dominion Experimental Farm in Kentville, N.S.

Dr. Bishop was reporting to the International Congress of Genetics in session here. He said artificial radiation had been used for this purpose for the first time.

Although a rosier Courtland has been achieved, he said, it will be five to seven years before it can be raised on a tree and compared with existing varieties to see if it is commercially worthwhile.

"The Courtland is a leading Canadian apple, but it is somewhat

Norway Will Welcome U.S. Atomic Sub

OSLO (AP) — Norway made ready an official welcome Friday night for the USS Skate despite neighboring Denmark's ban on a visit by the atomic submarine to Copenhagen.

A Norwegian naval source called the Danish decision utter nonsense. The Skate, inbound for Europe after a crossing under the north polar ice, is due in Bergen today.

Danish Premier Hans C. Hansen acted Thursday night on the recommendation of his atomic advisers. Fearing radioactivity, the advisers said a collision in the harbor might have disastrous consequences.

A spokesman for the French atomic energy commission said Denmark's action was "extraordinary and absurd in view of the fact the crew has lived aboard it for so long without a sign of contamination."

Government spokesmen in The Hague and Bonn emphasized the Skate will be welcome in Dutch and West German ports if she chooses to call.

"X-rays were used, and thermal neutrons from an atomic pile, in co-operation with the Brookhaven National Laboratory in Long Island," he said. "Brookhaven did the work and we provided apple scions—new shoots—for them to radiate. Then we did the grafting in Kentville."

The result is a complete change to dark red apples on some branches, he said. These are to be propagated to make several complete trees.

"Out of this may come a fine-looking apple which will retain the qualities of the Courtland, a good dual purpose apple."

Dr. Bishop said the present Courtland originated in Geneva, N.Y., a cross between a Macintosh and a Ben Davis.
