## VON WALDERSEE AND THE EMPEROR.

Count von Waldersee, who is to command the allied troops in China, is the only man who has ever been known to disobey the German Emperor. It happened in this wise. During the manoeuvres of 1895 the Emperor had proposed to the War Council of the day that the enemy's army should be met the next morning with a front attack. This suggestion was energetically opposed by Waldersee, and his objection won the day, his own plan of a flank attack being accepted by the majority of the Council. Hereupon the Emperor refused to undertake any responsibility for the next day's action, and contented himself with acting as umpire.

The next morning the Emperor appeared earlier than usual on the field, but Count Waldersee was before him, having arisen and aroused his men at two in the morning and kept them at a long forced march without halting, being certain that if his troops could stand the strain his plan of attack would succeed. Meanwhile the Emperor waited and waited, but there was no sign of Count Waldersee. His Majesty sent an adjutant to summons the General to come. Count Waldersee returned answer that he could not come. The Emperor then sent a high staff officer with the same command; but he returned with the same answer. The Hquerry-in-Chief, Count Wedel, was despatched in quest of the recalcitrant General; but the latter remained obdurate despite all remonstrances. Finally General von Hahnke was asked to summons Count Waldersee to the Emperor; his attempt to induce him to come proved likewise fruitless.

Shortly after General von Hahnke had left Count Waldersee, the latter's troops could be seen appearing in the distance. Then the Count galloped off to the Emperor. His Majesty received him with a frown. "You have kept your Emperor waiting a long while," he said, Count Waldersee answered very formally that he had issued instructions to his troops the night before, telling them that he personally should remain the whole day at a certain spot, ready to receive and send out messages; that if he had moved from his post he might have spoiled the whole manoeuvres. The Emperor thanked him and drove off, and no one was able to have word with him for the rest of the day.—Berlin Correspondence 'London Express.'

## A FOOLISH POSITION.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier was foolish and dishonest in his representation at Somerset Park of the action of the Government in regard to the troops sent to South Africa. He was back at his old "permitted to enlist" position, which is a false one. To say that the Government "permitted" the men who went to South Africa to enlist does not represent the situation. The Government asked men to enlist, appointed officers over them, armed them, equipped them, provided them even with "emergency rations," hired transports to take them to South Africa, obtained a grant from Parliament to pay them. It, in effect, when it saw how public opinion was shaping, did its duty. Those who are opposed to the country's taking part in the war will not be deceived by the Premier's misrepresentation, while those who think that he did right hold him in contempt for his failure to make his words as good as his act. What he is saying will only please and encourage those who are not worthy of such consideration, those who, like Mr Bourassa and Mr. Monet, refuse to accept the fact that the troops were sent and what that implies.—Montreal Gazette.

Attention has already been called to the extraordinary recoveries from bullet wounds sustained during the course of the South African campaign which when at first falling under observation, were regarded as fatal. The curious case has just been recorded of Trooper L. A. Palmer, of the Australian Horse, who nearly six months ago was wounded by a Mauser bullet in the head, and after a stay in various South African hospitals was invalided home to Europe. A few days ago in London, at the University College Hospital, Mr. Horsley, the well known surgeon, took a Roentgen ray photograph of the bullet apparently embedded in the brain of the subject, and succeeded in extracting it. Trooper Palmer was fit enough to accompany the colonials in their trip to Windsor, and so far as can be expected he has recovered from his injury.

A proclamation has been issued announcing that the Burghers who voluntarily surrender will not be sent out of the country, but will be detained in camps at Bloemfontein or Pretoria. In case of their having stock secreted representatives will be allowed to take charge of the cattle. The localities in which the herds will be kept will be designated by the commanding officers of the districts.

This proclamation gives great satisfaction to those who are anxious to see the war concluded as it is believed that it will give the coup de grace to the

Boer resistance. It has been repeatedly stated that many of the burghers would lay down their arms if they were assured that they would not be sent to St. Helena, or Cayon by the British.

'It's an ill wind that blows naebody guid.' Information has been received at Stirling Castle, that the Boer guerilla leader, De Wet, in one of his recent dashes upon British communications, captured, amongst other things, the defalter sheets of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, and they have neither been sent back nor recovered yet. If the papers don't turn up, the regimental black sheep of the A. and S. Highlanders will be able to start afresh with a clean sheet.
