Short Lobsters Result in Fines

SOURIS—Appearing on two separate charges of having the unlawful possession of short lobsters, James Aeneas Bailey, 22, was fined \$30 and costs or 10 days on each charge in Kings County magistrate's court here yesterday, before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. The first charge was for the possession of 35 short lobsters and the second charge for 25.

Appearing on a similar charge Gordon James MacDonald, Souris, pleaded guilty to having the unlawful possession of 73 short lobsters and was fined \$35 and costs or 15 days.

A charge of driving a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol was withdrawn against Daniel Harold MacDonald, St. Peters, at the request of the Crown. MacDonald was also charged with being intoxicated in a public place to which he pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Having the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased at a vendor cost Charles Alexander MacDonkey, Bear River, and Angus Joseph Campbell, Souris East, fines of \$25 and costs or 15 days when they appeared on separate charges.

Five persons pleaded guilty to having the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor in places other than their respective residences. Four were fined \$20 and costs or 15 days while the other was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days. Two others pleaded guilty to being intoxicated in a public place and were fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

The Crown was represented by J. Arthur McGuigan, deputy attorney-general.

New Ferry Tender Call Announced For June 15

Transport Minister Leon Balcer announced yesterday that tenders for the new car-ferry to run between Wood Islands and Carleton will be called June 15.

The tenders will be called by Northumberland Ferries Ltd., which will be responsible for the construction of the ferry. The government has entered into a contract with the company for 40 per cent of the construction cost. Mr. Balcer stated.

The operating subsidy will be in addition to that amount, he added.

Mr. Balcer made the statement after conferring briefly with Health Minister P.C. candidate who has been one of the Queens members in the past two parliaments. The minister stressed that Mr. MacQuarrie is "one of his kindest prodders on matters pertaining to transportation."

1,000 CARS PER DAY
 When the new ferry is available, the company can handle well over 1,000 cars per day on the 16-mile route, it was learned.

The minister gave his assurance that should a railway strike develop—June 4 is the deadline unless an agreement is reached—the government will give priority to getting an agreement between the unions and the railway that the car-ferry service at Borden will not be interrupted, "just as we did when the last rail strike threat developed," he observed.

"But I am hopeful that the strike will not develop. Negotiations are being carried on, and my colleague Mike Starr (minister of labor) is working closely with the principals," he emphasized.

Former Kinkora Man Dies in U.S.

John Keele, 57, a native of Kinkora, P.E.I., died suddenly early Tuesday at his home in Philadelphia, Pa.

Mr. Keele moved to Philadelphia shortly after his graduation from St. Dunstan's University in 1925. He was employed with the Pennsylvania Power Commission.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mary McCardie, Kinkora, P.E.I., two daughters and three sons—Connie, Angela, Daniel, John and Robert. Also surviving are 12 brothers and sisters—Rev. Fred Keele, Rollo Bay, P.E.I.; Leslie, St. Catharines, Ont.; Maurice and Leroy, Toronto; Earl, Gerald, and Leonard, Kinkora; Elmer, Halifax; Mary (Mrs. P. H. Curley), Ottawa; Sister Mary Edith, CSM, (Marion), Charlottetown; Sister Mary Angela, CSM, (Edith), Alberton, P.E.I.; and Kathleen, Mrs. William Murphy, Charlottetown.

He was a son of the late John Keele and Angela Monaghan, Kinkora.

Funeral services and burial will be held in Philadelphia.

For overtaking and passing another vehicle where there was a solid white line, James Robert Surgen, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs or five days. Operating a motor vehicle with defective equipment resulted in another accused being fined \$5 and costs or two days.

Annandale Contract Let For Repairs

A \$22,119 contract has been awarded by the federal department of public works to L. G. and M.H. Smith Ltd., Port Hood Island, N.S., to carry out repairs to the boat harbour at Annandale, P.E.I. It was announced yesterday by Mrs. Margaret Macdonald, P.C. candidate for Kings.

The firm submitted the lowest bid of three in response to advertising for public tenders, which closed on May 16, 1962. The highest bid was \$27,253.04. The work is scheduled for completion within eight months.

REPAIR WORK
 The work consists of repairs to the deck and bearing piles of the main wharf and in the walls and decks of the landing structure surrounding the boat shelter. Damaged or untreated piles and timber will be replaced with creosoted material and sections of the decks will be constructed with reinforced concrete.

Plans and specifications were prepared in the Charlottetown, P.E.I. district engineer's office of the department of public works.
