

Hayes Firm Has Low Bid On Road Job

A bid of \$297,485 by the Hayes Paving Company Limited, for paving 7.5 miles of the Trans-Canada Highway from Hampton to Strathgartney was lowest of seven tenders submitted. The tenders were opened by Highways Minister Philip Matheson yesterday.

Other firms and their bids were: Morrison and MacRae, \$279,045; Curran and Briggs, \$279,345; Warren Maritimes, \$272,665; Matheson and MacMillan, \$273,375; Island Excavators, \$277,625; and Island Construction, \$278,765.

Tenders were opened in the office of Highways Minister Philip Matheson at noon.

THIRD SECTION

These were bids on the third section of 22 miles of Trans-Canada Highway that is to be converted into an all-weather road this fall, between Borden and Strathgartney.

This low bid on the first section was submitted by Curran and Briggs Limited, of Toronto. This 7.5 miles runs from Borden to Tryon.

Morrison and MacRae was low bidder at \$279,485 on the 7.5 miles between Tryon and Hampton.
