N. B. Legislature Opened By Chief Justice McNair

FREDERICTON (CP) — The opening of the 43rd New Brunswick legislature by Chief Justice J. B. McNair, was devoted almost entirely to a review of government progress during the last year.

Only hint of legislation came near the end of the four - page address and promised "measures for the improvement of the services of the province and for the reform of the law will be submitted."

The speech said the Progressive Conservative government of Premier Hugh John Flemming will continue its efforts for "national adjustment grants and a revision in national economic policy" which would give the federal government a greater part in development of provincial natural resources.

"In the opinion of my government, action of such a nature

would affect a most desirable correction for the considerable variations in per capita income and economic opportunity which exist from province to province."

The government also plans to introduce legislation supplementing the final signing of a new federal-provincial tax agreement providing provincial assistance for construction of new draggers through the fishermen's loan board, and enabling an increase in the number of RCMP highway patrols to improve enforcement of the Motor Vehicle Act.

Chief Justice McNair, whose Liberal party was defeated at the polls in 1952 by the Flemming-led Conservatives, read the throne speech in place of Lieutenant-Governor D. L. MacLaren, receiving treatment in a Saint John, N.B. hospital for a First World War leg wound.
