TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. EUROPE AND THE EAST. LONDON, Aug. 3. The Prince of Wales, in declaring the Intercolonial Medical Congress open, said the Congress might already be regarded as very successful in having attracted a number of delegates, which had never been equalled, from every country in Europe and from the United States. The Baroness Burdett-Coutts and husband will visit America in October. The Duke of Argyll is to be married to the daughter of the Bishop of St. Albans, widow of Colonel Anson of the English army.

LONDON, Aug. 3. The House of Commons went into committee on supply to-day. The Irish members obstructed the vote for the expense of the household of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland until the close of the sitting. It is reported that the French Academy of Science publishes an engineers statement of the preliminary investigations into the geological structure of the Isthmus of Panama at the part to be traversed by the canal. The result is satisfactory, and De Lesseps calculates that the work can be done considerably under the sum originally estimated. Commander Henry Bonne, of the French Navy, the Secretary of the Panama Canal, died in the steamer Crescent City, en route here from Aspinwall. He was en route to France to report upon the progress of the canal.

LONDON, Aug. 3. Regarding the numerous amendments decided upon by the Conservatives for the Land Bill, the "Times" says: "It is quite certain that the Ministry and House of Commons will not be willing to accept these large changes to which the amendments of the Duke of Argyll, Lord Lansdowne and other Liberals will doubtless be added. Bradlaugh, in addressing the delegates who had come to London to present petitions on his behalf, said he had not quite recovered from the violence at the hands of the police, but that he intended to go to the House of Commons again, choosing his own time."

GOLETTA, Aug. 3. Two battalions of French troops and a battalion of artillery have arrived here and camped under the walls. UNITED STATES. NEW YORK, Aug. 3. It is stated that Guiteau handed a petition yesterday to District Attorney Corkhill praying for his release on bail of \$15,000, as the President is now regarded out of danger. He intimated he would have no difficulty in obtaining bail. The "Herald" says: Another of the White House employees, making eight altogether, has succumbed to malaria and gone home sick. One of the physicians says there has been no limit to giving of quinine to the President. Capsules are prepared with three grains each, and at least 250 have been given the patient during the last three weeks.

TROY, Aug. 3. Three men attempted to rob the Manufacturers' Bank at Cohoes, at noon yesterday. One invited the cashier to see a man in a carriage, while he was outside another requested the cashier to change a \$20 bill; another seized \$9,500 in bills, but the clerk, Clute, covered him with a revolver, when the thief dropped the money and fled, but was captured. The others escaped.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3. Two thirds of the town of Truckee was burned last night. Loss \$350,000. Front street is filled with temporary buildings. Carpenters from Reno and neighboring towns have come to labor and none are turned away. Tramps have flocked to the place in large numbers. It was rumored that the 601 which once gave Truckee notice throughout the land was to be re-organized for the purpose of keeping the demi monde from locating in their old quarters. At 6.30 p. m., the fire has been quenched about the Oddfellows' Hall. Only one life was lost.
