

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 1.

Fifteen thousand armed Albanians have resolved to defy their annexation to Servia.

The Turks were victorious in the great battle at Canea. The losses on both sides are heavy.

It is stated that Mehmet Ali, one of the Turkish Plenipotentiaries to Congress, has telegraphed the Porte for permission to leave Congress, as he despairs of securing justice at their hands.

The Governor of Lebanon has been recalled on account of his conduct, which nearly caused an insurrection.

LONDON, July 1.

A despatch from Pera on Friday, says: It is stated that the Porte is disappointed with Caratheodon Pasha, its plenipotentiary to Congress, and possibly Safvet Pasha, will himself go to Berlin with final and irrevocable instructions. Should Congress result unsatisfactorily to Turkey, the opposition will probably attempt a rising. News from Jersova shows that Turkish troops are moving west five battalions from Novi Bozar, will enter Herzegovina. Austria has concentrated considerable force on the frontier, so as to avoid the necessity of sending reinforcements after the frontier was crossed.

Latest official news from Constantinople despatches on Sunday night, states that Turkey is negotiating with Austria, and an understanding may be arrived at.

Feze Pasha is appointed to replace Baker Pasha in command of an army corps.

VIENNA, July 1.

General Philippopoli will, it is believed, command the troops destined for Bosnia and General Jovanovich those to Herzegovina. A Civil Commission will accompany them for the purpose of organizing the administration of the country.

THE Supreme Court adjourned its sitting, owing to three of the jurors sitting on the case pending being secretaries of School Districts, and obliged to attend three of the school meetings held throughout the Island to-day.

ON Friday night last, about 11 o'clock, a man named Hugh Connolly was assaulted by three men at the West End of this city and robbed of \$40. Six suspicious persons were arrested for the robbery and brought before the Stipendiary this morning. Mr. Connolly identified two of the prisoners, Wm. Byers and Thos. Noonan, as the parties who robbed him; but they produced sufficient evidence to prove an alibi. Two of the prisoners arrested were remanded 8 days and the others were discharged.

## The Governor General.

We fear there is no truth in the report that the period of service of the Governor General is to be extended. An enterprising member of the staff of the Boston Globe interviewed His Excellency on the subject, and with the following result:

In answer to an enquiry if it were true that the Home Government had decided to extend his term of office in accordance with the general desire of the Canadian people, the Earl said that there was no truth whatever in the report, that his family and household effects had left for England last week, and that he would follow in September.

The same paper publishes a despatch from the Montreal Herald of Friday, contradicting the report that the Governor General's term was to be extended. This news will be heard with regret.—Telegraph.

Mr. Tilley.

Without knowing anything of Mr. Tilley's motives for coming back into political life, we can readily understand that he is anxious to have his hands freed, so that he may be in a position to vindicate his conduct during the time he was Finance Minister, and reply to the many unworthy attacks which have been made upon him by the "mixer and muddler." Mr. Tilley is a prominent figure in all the financial discussions. It was he who brought down the estimates for the year 1873-4, the expenditures during which the present Government repudiate, though under their control for eight months out of the twelve. We have no doubt when Mr. Tilley comes to deal with this particular branch of the financial question that he will lay many a broad lash upon Mr. Cartwright's back and make the heaven-born financier wish that he had left him alone. For well nigh five years Mr. Tilley's mouth has been closed. He knew too well the obligations of the Lieutenant Governor's office to play the partisan like Luc. Letellier The First; but we much mistake if he will not heartily relish a release which enables him to throw off the fetters which have bound him for so long a time.

The will of Thomas E. Davis, filed for probate at New York, leaves three millions to his widow and seven children.

The President of the French Geographical Society will present the Cross of the Legion of Honor to Mr. Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, at Sorborne lately.

The King of the Belgians, who takes the greatest interest in African explorations, is preparing to send H. M. Stanley out with an expedition, in which England has declined to unite.

A Berlin dispatch says Prince Gortschakoff is being seriously urged by his physicians and the members of his family to proceed to Wildbad, the waters of which place have frequently done him good.

A wag, and yet a friend of Herr Diem, a well known violoncellist, recently gave the hand of the latter, in Stuttgart, such an intensely friendly squeeze as to disable him for several weeks. The musician brought an action and recovered 240 marks and costs.

The Paris police are spending much of their time at the Grand Hotel. The Shah of Persia, who has \$200,000 worth of jewels with him, and several royal princes, bring the hotel a number of guests who "run their faces" to make their fortunes. The Duke of Aosta has suffered already.

Politics are in fever heat in Lennox Co. The contest between Hon. Wm. McDougall and the Finance Minister promises to be one of the keenest which will take place in the Dominion. According to the Napanee Standard, Mr. McDougall's candidature is meeting with great success.

Mr. Nicholas Flood Davin, the talented and eloquent Irish orator, and author of "The Irishman in Canada," is the Conservative candidate for the Commons in Haldimand. Mr. Davin's chances of election are reported excellent, and he would be a valuable acquisition to the Canadian Parliament.

The Grits up in Bruce County are as much agitated and frightened over the contemplated visit this week to that county by the Hon. Senator Macpherson as if a band of Fenians were threatening to invade that part of Canada. The grand and noble Senator will so effectually show up the so-called party of Purity that the prospect of any Grit being elected will be very slim indeed.

Lord Claude John Hamilton, M. P. for King's Lynn, the second son of the Duke of Abercorn, who visited America a few years ago, is about to marry Miss Caroline Chandos-Pole, a daughter of Lady Anna Chandos-Pole, of Derbyshire, and a niece of the Earl of Harrington.

It is reported that at a State dinner at the Royal Palace at Brussels on the 9th inst., the King gave the toast of the Queen of England and the success of the Congress, and that Lord Beaconsfield in replying said that "as long as there will be an England there will be a Belgium."

Mr. Austen Henry Layard, the British Ambassador at Constantinople, has become Sir Austen Layard as a Grand Cross of the Bath. He used to be called in Parliament "Lord Palmerston's liar," as being always put forward to tell graceful or emphatic fibs whenever it was necessary to protect some rash act of the Ministry.
