### WINTER

Inevitably winter must come, only the date is in doubt, the later the better, but if the problem must be faced up to the last day of November or the first of December?

The first snowfall, while it is received with mixed reactions does seem to brighten to some extent the early evenings and late mornings. In this cold climate the protecting blanket of snow serves a useful purpose for the drifting snow may not be a pleasant prospect, yet perhaps it is preferable to sub zero temperatures and winds howling over a bare and frozen landscape. If winter we must have then perhaps snow is the best trimming for it.

### POTATO ORGANIZATION

The topic which we are about to discuss is a touchy one and certainly difficult to handle with impartiality. It is being charged with prejudice, the delegation of potato growers which met the Government on Thursday, November 25, had a number of recommendations to make, recommendations which were based in part upon an analysis of the plebiscite results.

Analyzing election or plebiscite returns can be an interesting pastime, opinions as to what the voter really meant can be many. This is possibly the reason why cold figures are accepted as the only valid and legal interpretation.

We do not intend to express an opinion as to the value or otherwise of the proposed new potato organization, however, we would point out that there is a very real danger in having competing organizations each claiming to speak for the industry. It may be argued with some justice that the 4,000 plus producers who voted for the Board could hardly be expected to be unanimous in their support of the new group and that the lack of harmony which the brief in question deplores may still be expected to continue.

We agree that the potato industry should be organized in this Province, whether such an organization can function most effectively as a voluntary one or should have a certain amount of legal legislative authority seems to be the point at issue, whether the opinion expressed by the seventy man delegation fairly represents as is claimed, the opinion of the majority, it is difficult to know, but some caution would appear to be indicated in accepting it and discarding what over four thousand indicated in the plebiscite.

**BUTTER IS DOWN**  
We hasten to apologize to the consumer for the misleading nature of the sub-topical, we mean that butter production is down, down 18,000 pounds for the week of November 29th, as compared to the same week last year. This decline may be attributed to a number of factors some of which are:  
(1) The heavy production of the

summer months which brought on a rapid decline in the fall.  
(2) Low quality hay, and  
(3) Reasonably good potato prices.

Good potato prices appear to have a drying-up effect upon many which cows.

### WHO SAID IT?

Forsythe, president, Dominion Steel and Coal Company, in the course of an address to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce Convention in Halifax.

### APPLE SUPPORT

Announcement has been made that the federal government, under the provisions of the Agricultural Prices Support Act, will come to the relief of Nova Scotia apple growers who suffered heavy losses in the hurricane which swept the apple orchards of the province some weeks ago. The government will pay 90 cents bushel, tree run, for the windfall apples.

The new support plan will be administered by a board which took charge October 8, made up of Federal and Provincial officials. It is understood that the support plan will apply only to apples blown off the trees, and the estimate is that this will total some 1,170,000 bushels, or about 70% of the estimated total crop. It has been estimated that some 850,000 bushels remained on the trees and these will be marketed in the normal manner.
