A. does not recognize this as a proper title defence, that Salas is only the seventh-ranking featherweight, and that a lot of good lightweight were bypassed in making the match.

"However," Rochon said, "any time the lightweight champion boxes over the proper title distance with champion and challenger coming in at or under the lightweight limit, the title is at stake."  
"If Salas wins, he's champion."

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## Oppose Raising Age Limit For Junior Hockey

WINNIPEG, May 1—(CP)—The executive of the Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association Wednesday night unanimously opposed raising the age limit of junior hockey players from 20 to 21.

The proposal, originally sponsored by the Alberta branch, will come before the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association annual meeting in Minaki, Ont., June 15-18.

The Alberta branch said that juniors had become the main source of revenue for the branch and that raising the age limit would produce better hockey. The Manitoba executive said professionally-sponsored clubs in Ontario would be the main beneficiaries to the detriment of Manitoba and the smaller branches.

Under the rule allowing two branch-to-branch transfers each season, the higher age limit would enable Ontario clubs to transfer two additional players. The Manitoba executive said the result would be that a greater number of better and more mature players would be transferred by the pro-sponsored organizations.

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## Stanky Moves To Bolster Cardinals

ST. LOUIS, May 1—(AP)—Manager Eddie Stanky is benching veteran outfielder Enos Slaughter and third baseman Billy Johnson and putting himself in the line-up in an effort to bolster his faltering St. Louis Cardinals.

He announced the shake-up Wednesday after the fifth-place Redbirds had dropped their third home game in a row, their latest to Brooklyn 4-1, last night.

Stanky decided to shift Red Schoendienst from second to third base and sent Wally Westlake, who had been on the bench of late, back to the outfield against Brooklyn tonight.

Sanky put himself in the leadoff spot in the batting order. He also switched Stan Musial from left to right, sending Peanuts Lowry to left, and Westlake to centre.
