policy session saying there should be no restriction on the use of judicial injunctions in labor disputes where necessary to enforce the law.

The proposal, presented by the London, Ont., chamber of Commerce, must be ratified by a plenary session Wednesday before it becomes official policy of the national chamber.

In other labor-management policy votes, delegates expressed official opposition to the Rand formula—which for 20 years has seen workers who don't belong to a union representing fellow workers pay dues on grounds they gain benefits from the union—and called for a prohibition on strikes or lockouts endangering the health or safety of the public.

In presenting the motion on injunctions, R. J. Woxman of the London delegation said good citizenship, "whether it be labor or management cannot recognize or tolerate tactics of intimidation, harassment, obstruction or threats of violence or the rendering of damage to property."

**DENIES IT'S ANTI-LABOR**

Emphasizing that the delegation was not taking an anti-labor attitude, Mr. Woxman said a few "unions" are "evidently believe that if any phase of the law becomes restrictive to their opinions or actions then the law is itself redundant."

The debate on the Rand formula developed on a proposal that the chamber "as a matter

of public policy" oppose compulsory union membership or dues "voluntarily" if approved.

The delegates also voted in favor of a motion from the Vancouver board of trade that labor disputes in areas affecting the health or safety of the public be settled by arbitration.

In other policy votes—all dependent on winning support at Wednesday's plenary session—the delegates called for a more vigorous attempt by the government to develop Canada's oil industry in the context of a North American market and for an all-out attack on pollution.

On oil, delegates noted net imports now are worth \$240,000,000 annually, and said a vigorous policy should be adopted where possible to reduce this reliance on foreign shipments.

Production from Canadian oil fields should have a fair share of the total North American market, the motion said.

Charles Lee of Calgary, president of Western Decal Petroleum Ltd. and president of the Independent Petroleum Association of Canada, said reserves in Canada—excluding recent northern finds—has increased in six years to 7,000,000,000 barrels from 4,200,000,000.

Based on this, delegates were told, Canada has the capacity to produce 20 per cent of North America's needs, but actually was turning out only 7 1/2 per cent.

**Unions Demand Ship Companies Observe Code**

OTTAWA (CP) — Four shipping unions have banded together to demand that shipping companies adhere to the federal labor code and give sailors shorter work hours and extra pay for holidays.

The unions took strong exception to a suspension of the terms of the code they say was granted to shipping companies without their knowledge. They drafted a letter to Labor Minister Nicholson outlining their objections and calling for an inquiry.

The Seafarers International Union, the Canadian Merchant Service Guild, Canadian Marine Officers Union and Canadian Maritime Union, which represent some 14,000 ship workers, say wages for about 88,000 working days totalling \$1,400,000 is at stake.

The unions set out these three main complaints:

- It was a discriminatory action for the government to exempt shipping companies from the labor code without reference to employees.
- An inquiry should be held as soon as possible to expedite application of the code to the shipping industry.
- Time off for sailors should be granted "in a normal social environment"—not cooped up aboard ship.

**PASSED CODE LAST YEAR**

The federal labor standards code passed by Parliament last year sets out a minimum hourly wage of \$1.25, a 40-hour week with a maximum of eight hours overtime in any week and provides for eight statutory holidays for which employees must either be given time off or paid at the rate of time and a half.

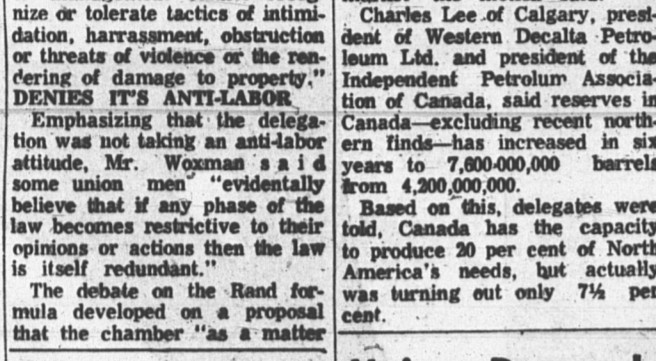
"Some of the Canadian sailors work as many as 100 hours a week," the unions said in a statement.

They claim shipping companies were given a "blanket exemption" from the terms of the code without any consultation with employees.

The union men feel terms of the code could best be met through a system of "lay days." Under such a system a sailor might work aboard ship for 30 days, then have 30 days off.

### CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:

South West North East

Opening lead—jack of hearts. This hand occurred in the match between Poland and Iceland during the European championships played in Baden-Baden in 1963.

When the Polish team had the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. Obviously, something went wrong with the bidding, since the Poles undertook a slam with two immediate club losers and the possibility of also losing a trump trick or two.

However, the sun shone brightly that day on the South Pole, and he succeeded in making the slam. West made the normal lead of the jack of

hearts, and South proceeded to score twelve airtight tricks.

He took the heart with the ace, ruffed a heart, cashed the A-K-Q of diamonds on which he discarded the J-6 of clubs, ruffed a club, ruffed a heart, ruffed a club, and then ruffed his last heart.

By this time nine tricks had been played and South had won them all. The lead was in dummy and South's last four cards were the A-K-J-5 of spades, while West's last four cards were the Q-J-8-7 of spades.

Declarer was now sure of the slam regardless of how the remaining cards were divided. He led a club from dummy and ruffed it with the eight. West overruffed with the nine but then had to give the last three tricks to South.

Peculiarly enough, even four spades could have been defeated if West had been sufficiently inspired to lead the king and another club originally. A club continuation by East at trick three would have settled declarer's hash.

The Icelandic East-West pair thus took quite a beating on the deal by permitting the Poles to score a very lucky slam, but their misfortune turned into a full-scale calamity, when it turned out that their North-South teammates at the other table had a bidding misunderstanding and wound up playing the hand at five clubs, down one.

# Rail Reform Measure Said Needed Soon

OTTAWA (CP) — Transport Minister Pickersgill told the Commons transportation committee it is important to get the railway reform bill passed by Parliament by the end of the year.

Both the railways and the government would be faced with "a critical situation" if it was not in effect by Jan. 1, he said.

There would be substantial wage increases to rail employees with no change in operating arrangements for the railways.
