## RUSSIAN OFFICIALS AND LI HUNG CHANG

### Strange Friendship Between Them.

A CLOSE UNDERSTANDING EXISTS.

Further Particulars About The Amur Atrocities.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

Tien Tsin, Sept. 22.—Li Hung Chang has arrived here and is domiciled in his own yamen under Cossack guards.

His reception here was a repetition of his reception at Tong Ku, only Russian and Japanese officers calling on him, those of other nations not taking part in it.

The manner of Earl Li's reception seems to confirm the suspicion existing in Shanghai regarding his close understanding with Russia.

About 400 Russians troops and all the principal Russian officers met him at Chang Lidgen Chen Hay on the way to Tien Tsin.

A long conference was held at which no representative of any other power was present.

This remarkable friendship exists at a time when the two continents are ringing with the story of the massacre of the Chinese in Amur.

The Moscow correspondent of the Standard, reverting to the subject of the massacre says:

"From a recent visit to the Amur region, it is reported that massacres are the order of the day with the troops that are overrunning Manchuria. The orders are issued by General Grodokoff. But it is quite certain that the Emperor Nicholas must be ignorant of their nature. My informant has seen a series of telegrams from one Manchurian commander in every one of which he beseeches that he be allowed to spare the peaceful citizens. But Russian indifference to the lives of the common herd is still of a truly Oriental type.

The same correspondent asserts that troops, by the wholesale, continue to pour into Manchuria.

#### MR QUINN'S TESTIMONY.

Good Prospects of the Opposition in Quebec.

Mr. M. J. F. Quinn, M. P. for St. Ann's, Montreal, was one of the speakers at the great Liberal Conservative meeting in Toronto. The Province of Quebec, he said, possessed a man who was superlatively imaginative, and who was attempting the extraordinary but disappointing process of extracting sunbeams from cucumbers. (Laughter.) He referred to Mr. Tarte. (Laughter and hisses.) Not long ago Mr. Tarte, before he went to Europe, notified the public that the Administration of which he is master would win 60 out of the 65 seats in Quebec. After Mr. Tarte had been back from Europe a few days he announced that Sir Wilfrid would have fifty-five supporters from Quebec. A few days later Mr. Tarte announced that Sir Charles Tupper would only have 14 from Quebec, which meant that the Liberals would have 51. Last night Mr. Tarte declared that Sir Charles Tupper would not have more than 20 from Quebec. Mr. Tarte imagined that he was playing a bluff, and was trying to bluff, or held a bad hand and did not quite understand what he was up against. (Laughter.) Mr. Quinn said he did not mind telling them in confidence that the Conservatives expected in Quebec at least 25. He did not want to stretch it, but he really expected 30, and if the fear which seemed to have taken possession of the Government continued for a while longer, so as to prevent them from dissolving the House, the Conservatives would carry the province by a substantial majority. (Applause.) As evidence of the change of feeling in Quebec, Mr. Quinn contrasted the large and enthusiastic meetings held in Montreal recently with those held there in 1896. There was, he said, a general feeling in the province that Laurier had betrayed the interests of his people, and had been a great disappointment to them in every way. Added to this, there was the fact that a strong sentiment of Conservatism actuated all the French-Canadian people. Mr. Quinn said he would tell to the people of Montreal the greetings of this meeting and tell them how heartily a representative of Quebec was received in Toronto. (Cheers.)

#### Kruger's Resort.

THE HAGUE, Sept. 21.—The government of the Netherlands has been notified of Mr. Kruger's acceptance of its offer to place a warship at his disposal to convey him from Lorenzo Marques to Holland.

#### HOLLAND TO THE RESCUE.

Comment of the London Standard

London, Thursday, Sept. 20.—The Standard, which is a Ministerial organ, declares that the action of Holland in offering passage on one of her warships to President Kruger is an act of intervention which might very properly be resented by those against whom it is directed. It says that it Jefferson Davies had escaped to Mexico after the war of the rebellion, and England or France had offered to bring him to Europe on a warship, the Federal Government would surely have regarded such action as an insult. It adds that except on the incredible supposition that the consent of Great Britain was first obtained, the action of Holland is both provocative and insolent. It has not even the merit of courage, since there is little probability that any official resentment of a kind likely to lead to hostilities will be shown. The paper contends that there is nothing in the relations of the English and Dutch to justify this manifestation of ill-will. It concludes by saying that if the Dutch rank themselves among the enemies of Great Britain they must take the consequences.

The game is very obvious. Tarte is to conduct an anti-British campaign, and the Toronto organ an anti-Catholic campaign on behalf of the great "new Liberal" principle, "Five more years of a full pocket."—Mail and Empire.
