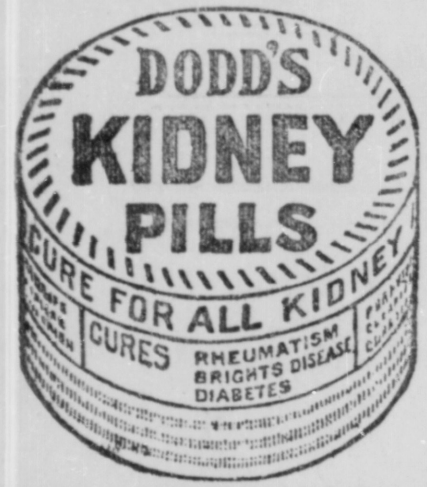

GALA DAY IN IRISHTOWN

Picnic in Honor of Mr. Ready — Complimentary Address.

Tuesday was a gala day in Irishtown. A scene of thirty years ago was enacted with a different dramatic persons. The scene of thirty years ago was a grand picnic in honor of Mr. John Forristal who, after a term of 25 years, has resigned his position of teacher of Irishtown school. The picnic of Tuesday was held in honor of Mr. J. A. Ready who, after a service of two years, has severed his connection with the same school. About 300 people were present. The scene of merriment was beneath the shady canopy of "Maple Grove," on the grounds of Mr. Wm. Mann, Irishtown. A more ideal spot for a picnic could not be found. The tables were spread under trees that formed a canopy of brightest green against a sky of heavenly blue. The tables were exceedingly fine, and were loaded with all the good things imaginable, and the little fellows by working hard, managed to appropriate a sufficient quantity to render them unusually expansive. In a meadow nearby games of all kinds were contested, while from the grand stand sounds of music sweet were emitted from a string orchestra and the school choir. All present were delighted, and the old people said they attended no picnic so good since thirty years ago. In the evening a soiree in Mr. Ready's honor was held at the residence of Mrs. Wm. Mann, where the young folk passed a most pleasant and enjoyable time.

The school examination was held on Wednesday forenoon, and the reader can learn how successful it was from the following address, which was read by Mr. John A. Millman:

To J. A. Ready, B. A., teacher of Irishtown school.

DEAR SIR,—We, the undersigned residents of the Irishtown school district, learn with regret that you are about to leave this school, in which for the last two years you have labored so successfully. We cannot allow you to depart without expressing our high appreciation of your services during the time you have had charge of our school. A Curious Case.

PARIS, July 4.—A verdict has been rendered in the curious case of Getron V. Dutuc. The plaintiff and defendant, who were neighbours, traded wives some time ago, and the exchange did not disturb their friendship until M. Getron realized that all the children of the families had fallen to his share. He was supporting not only the two children of his first marriage, but also the three of the former Mme. Dutuc, now Mme. Getron. He demanded that M. Dutuc pay him half of the cost of rearing the children. He lost the suit, the court declaring that the Dutuc owe nothing to the Getrons, because the obligation of parents to bring up their children is not an in solido obligation. Consequently the parent who has alone discharge the obligation cannot afterwards claim payment from the other of half the sum he or she has thus voluntarily disturbed.

Unpleasant Experience

LONDON, July 4.—Inhabitants of Thurso, in the far North of Scotland, are at present undergoing a most curious, if unpleasant experience. The other day, during a strong wind, over a hundred bottle-nosed whales were stranded along the coast close to the town. To remove them, far less bury them, was out of the power of the inhabitants, and the June sun, which is pouring its rays upon the bleached bottles, is making the little town almost uninhabitable. Short of a convulsion of nature to clear the fibre of the whales and decrease the offensive odour, the prospect of being compelled to vacate their homes for the remainder of the summer.

NEWS NOTES.

Two deaths have occurred of two famous horses. One of them was Gen. Lord Roberts' grey Arab charger Violette, which was 29 years old. He bore Lord Roberts in his African campaigns, and the Queen conferred medals on the animal for his services, which were worn on his martingale when he conspicuously carried Gen. Roberts in Her Majesty's jubilee procession. The other animal was the Prince of Wales' brood mare Perdita II, which was the dam of Persimmon and other racers.
