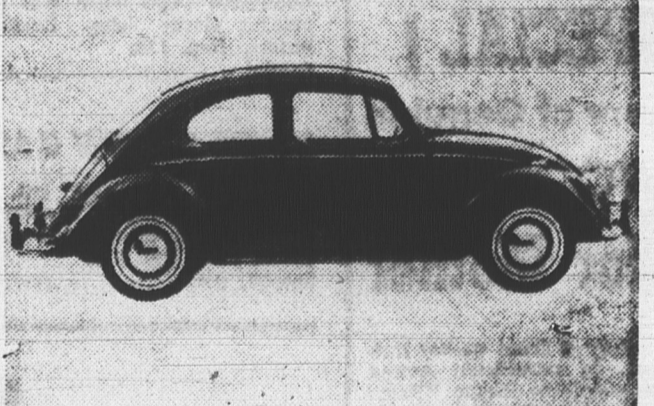
She was a member of Montague United Church choir, the U.C.W. and Women's Institute, and was always active in the work of the church and the community.

Brief Promoting Province Wins Award For Publisher

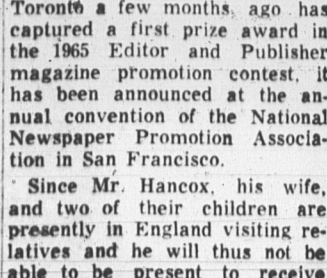
A brief promoting the attractions of Prince Edward Island to audiences of national advertisers' representatives and telling them how to participate in the P.E.I. market through advertising in the Guardian-Patriot has just won an international award for these newspapers through W. J. Hancox, publisher.

The audio-visual presentation by Mr. Hancox in Montreal and Toronto a few months ago has captured a first prize award in the 1965 Editor and Publisher magazine promotion contest. It has been announced at the annual convention of the National Newspaper Promotion Association in San Francisco.

Since Mr. Hancox, his wife, and two of their children are presently in England visiting relatives and he will thus not be able to be present to receive the award in San Francisco tomorrow, the honor will be received in his behalf by a representative of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Publishers Association, of which Bill Hancox is a member.

It is believed this is the first time that a Canadian and Canadian newspaper have won the distinction of first place for audio-visual presentations in the international contest in competition with the daily newspapers of the whole continent. Mr. Hancox was notified in advance of the formal announcement through a letter received here in Charlottetown and signed by Robert U. Brown, publisher and editor of the sponsoring magazine.

The prize winning promotion by Bill Hancox before advertisers and advertising agency people was in the form of a film slide show featuring colored slides of Island scenes, activities, Island people and industries.
