Make Plans For Co-op Store At Montague

A special meeting was held at Yeo's Theatre, Montague, last evening to discuss proposed plans for the organization of a co-operative in Montague. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Charles Yeo, Lot 16.

Mr. J.G. Dennis, Charlottetown, supervisor of Island co-operatives gave a brief resume of what had been accomplished up to the present. He said that following numerous requests from the district, the work of organizing a co-operative at Montague was begun. He stated that a considerable area had already been canvassed, and already over \$7,000.00 had been pledged. Meetings were held last week in New Perth, Valleyfield and Whim Road, and the response was most favorable.

He intended, he said, should the program go through, to open a modern up-to-date self service store in the property owned by Bergmann, dealing in groceries, fruits and meats. There would also be sufficient room for a feed warehouse, egg grading station and poultry room.

He said that a canvass would now begin in Montague to bring in members who would pledge one or more shares or provide loan capital in order to start the enterprise. Rev. H. Dalton, minister of the United Church at Moncton, N. B., spoke glowingly of the work of the co-operative. Rev. Mr. Dalton has been an active worker from both the practical and educational standpoint in the co-operative movement for many years.

Rev. Mr. Dalton went on to explain the working of the co-operative, and how it was so designed to assist each member, and also to help the whole group.

Other speakers during the evening were Rod McNeven, manager of the Summerside store, Len MacDonald, Island Co-Op Services, Capt. J. J. MacDonald, Leo Corcoran, S.S. Hession, Q.C., and Wilfred MacDonald.

The meeting decided to hold the organizational meeting on Wednesday, October 7th, at Yeo's Theatre, and a nominating committee including Lincoln Dewar, Wilfred

MacDonald and Eugene Dunn was appointed to bring in a slate of officers. A vote of thanks, moved by Mr. S. S. Hession, Q.C., seconded by Mr. Lincoln Dewar, was extended Rev. Mr. Dalton for his timely and instructive address.

Continued from page 1 Junior, senior and grand championships. Reserve honors in these classes went to Gavin Reid and Son, Victoria Cross.

Wallie Wood of Marshfield, son of Almon Wood, placed the classes. He stated that tops in all classes were good and that many of the animals would do well at the Provincial Exhibition.

Mr. R. C. Parent, superintendent of the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, was an interested spectator. Mr. Parent had warm praise for the show and the quality of the animals exhibited.

Competition in the Ayrshire classes was very keen. Among those taking the greater number of high placings were Gavin Reid and Son of Victoria Cross; Edwin Reid and Son, Rollo Bay; N. W. MacLeod and Sons, Dundas Brent, Stead, Bay Fortune; Robert White, Rollo Bay; J. A. MacLeod and Son, Dundas, and Henry Mallard and Sons, Gowan Brae.

Edwin Reid and Son and Gavin Reid and Son led the Ayrshire exhibitors with four first placings each. N. W. MacLeod and Sons had two first placings as did Henry Mallard and Sons.

Other first placings were won by J. A. MacLeod and Son, Brent Stead, John Gillis and Robert White.

First Year At Fair George MacMillan of Cornwall, who placed the Jersey cattle, stated that the Jersey breeders put on an outstanding show for their first year at the Fair. He said that the quality of the 40 or more animals exhibited was very high and compared favorably with any he had seen in the Province.

Douglas Matheson and Arthur MacDonald of St. Peter's Bay took the majority of top honors although they were given stiff competition by Ernest Underhay of Bay Fortune and Francis Morrison of St. Peter's Bay.

Matheson won top honors in the female competitions as he showed the grand champion and reserve. His River North Patay won the grand and Becons Geneva went reserve.

The grand championship in the male classes went to Arthur MacDonald as his Standard Jesters Beeson won the honors. River North Poppy's Jester owned by Doug Matheson was reserve male. Matheson and MacDonald won eleven of the twelve classes. Matheson had six first and MacDonald five while Ernest Underhay had the other first placing.

Matheson won firsts in the classes for junior bull calf, aged bull, female calves, aged cows in milk, get of sire, and senior groups. MacDonald swept top honors in the classes for yearling bulls, yearling females, aged cows dry, progeny of dam and junior group.

He stated that he was surprised at the high quality of all the animals in the show particularly those at the top of the classes.

The Dixon Brothers also showed the junior female champion in Dixonhill Sally their yearling calf

who won the Provincial Championship at the Rural Youth Fair in Charlottetown last week.

The female grand champion reserve ribbon went to Charles S. Colby, C. Lewis of Freetown, a veteran and prominent Holstein cattle exhibitor judged the Holstein classes and he complimented the breeders very highly on the quality of their cattle.

The Dixon Bros., Charles S. MacDonald, Preston Bryenton of Rollo Bay and Brent Wood of Dundas won all the honors.

MacDonald won the male classes and also the class for the four year old in milk. The Dixon's took the classes for the junior calf, junior yearling, two year old female and three year old females dry. Bryenton won the grade classes.
