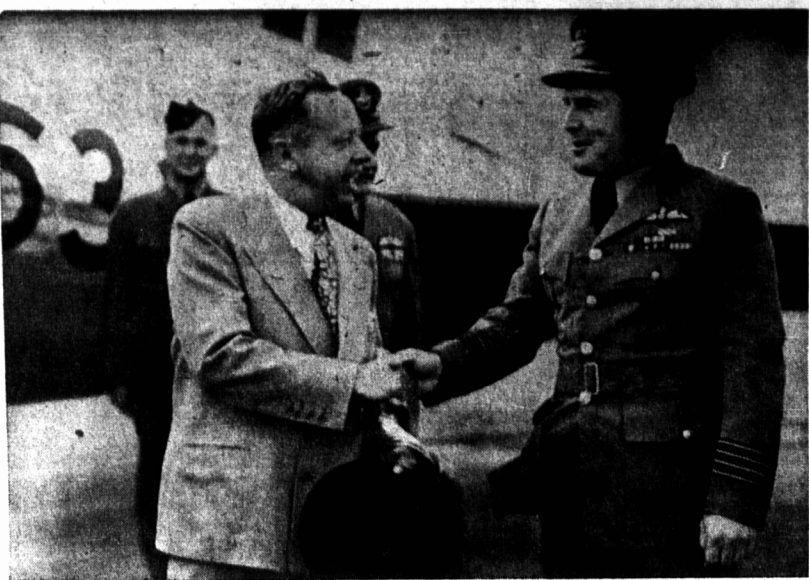

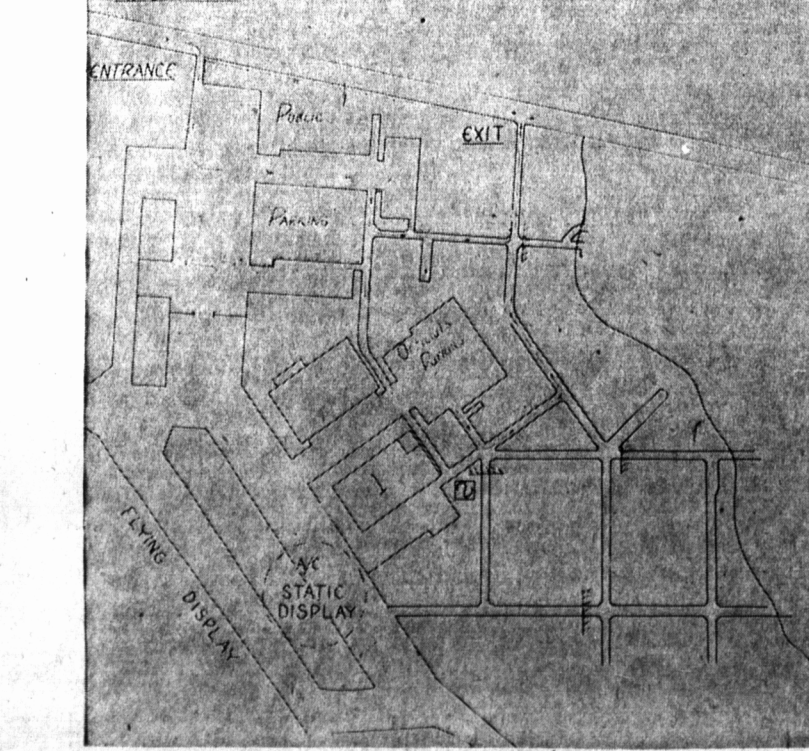
Gala Get Together Of Business And Professional Women's Club Members
