A HEROINE OF ROME

Herotis was a slave-maid of Rome, who saved her country from destruction. After the siege of Rome by the Gauls, about 381 B. C., the Fidenates marched with an army against the capital, demanding all the wives and daughters in the city as the only conditions of peace. Philotas advised the senators to send all the female slaves disguised in matrons' clothes. She offered to march at their head into the camp of the enemy. The advice was followed, and when the Fidenates, having fasted late, had fallen asleep, intoxicated, Philotas lighted a torch as a signal for her countrymen to attack the enemy. The Fidenates were defeated and the senate rewarded the fidelity of the slaves who allowed them to appear in the dress of the Roman matrons.
