Ch'town K. Of C. Council Observes 50th Anniversary

Mr. Gregory T. Feeney, Q.C., Supreme Director of the Knights of Columbus and State Deputy for New Brunswick was guest speaker at the 50th anniversary banquet of Charlottetown Council 824 held at the Charlottetown Hotel last evening.

More than 275 were in attendance at the colorful and enjoyable function, including knights and their wives. The honour of cutting the beautiful birthday cake fell to Mr. L. B. MacMillan, O.B.E., a charter member.

Mr. George W. Cheverie, Deputy Grand Knight acted as toastmaster and called successively for toasts to "the Queen", "The Church", responded to by Most Rev. James Boyle, D.D.; "Our Order", responded to by W. J. P. MacMillan, M.D., K.C.S.G.; and "Charter Members", responded to by Right Rev. G. J. McLellan, I., V.G.

A hearty welcome was extended by Grand Knight Morrissey to visiting knights and their ladies from Maritime province points and Island Councils.

Bishop Boyle
During his reply to the toast to "the Church", His Excellency Bishop Boyle referred to the trials of the Church down through the centuries. "Threatened with extinction, but never to die", the Church was presented first by the Roman Empire in the first century, secondly by the Aryans during the great heresy in the fourth century. During the reformation in the sixteenth Century the church suffered great losses and later during the Napoleonic reign defections and persecutions interfered with her growth and progress.

"But Waterloo came, Napoleon fell, but the Church remained, reeling though erect", His Excellency said. "Let us not be disheartened if the Church is undergoing a terrible persecution today. Christ said—"They will hate you and persecute you as they have hated and persecuted Me". Faithful to her mission, the Church has always taught the doctrines of the Gospel, her keeping. But just as the teachings of the Master went against the popular notion of His day so do the teachings of the Church conflict with the fads, theories and errors of each age.

If the Church conformed to the popular notion of the day, she would not be the truth, for the popular notions of the day change with the passing of the year, while truth is eternally the same.
Bear in mind that it is not the mission of the Church to make men happy. Its business is to tell them the truth—not to bring about justice and freedom in the political society but to give mankind salvation and eternal life." His Excellency concluded.

Replying to the toast to "The Order", Dr. MacMillan gave a comprehensive and interesting resume of the history of the Order founded in 1882.

In particular he referred to the work of the Knights of Columbus Canadian Army Huts in two wars and to the scholarship fund set up by the Order for the advancement of education. He also referred to the organization of the State Council of the Order in P. E. Island, and to the educational fund set up by that body for the

Unprecedented Success Of PEI Potato Men At Amherst

"Never has it been known for one Province to so completely dominate the prize winning events at any show," said Mr. H. L. MacLaren, Chief Inspector of the Seed Certification Branch in referring to the magnificent showing made by Island potato exhibitors at the Maritime Winter Fair. Out of six classes, Island tubers placed first in all six. Mr. MacLaren has just returned from Amherst, where in company with two other chief inspectors, Messrs. Roy Layton, Kentville and Charles Wry of Fredericton he acted as a judge at the seed potato exhibit.

A summary of the winners show that in the Irish Cobbler class, out of 20 entries, Islanders won 17 prizes with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick winning two and one respectively. The Sebago class told a better story, which shows that out of 20 entries Islanders won them all. In the Kathadin class the score was 14, 0 and 6 for P.E.I., N.S., and N.B. respectively. This was also out of 20 entries. In the "any colored variety" class the record shows our potatoes on top with a score of 7 out of 10.

The over all fair winners saw Mr. James E. MacNeill declared the Grand Champion with a prize of \$125. by Canadian Industries Ltd. Mr. Alexis MacLean, Elmira won the reserve Grand Championship with a prize of \$75, awarded by the International Fertilizer Co. and John C. MacBeath, St. Peter's, was the winner of the John & Haas Company prize of 25 gallons of Dithane Special valued at \$60.
