

City Council To Purchase Snowblower & Payloader

The decision to purchase a snowblower was taken by the City Council last night when it passed a resolution authorizing the City Clerk to call for tenders for such equipment. The tenders close at City Hall on September 19th at twelve o'clock noon.

It was indicated that a payloader will also be purchased. Tenders for this equipment have already been received and they can be dealt with later when the tenders for the snowblower are opened, it was explained.

During the meeting Councillor Foster reported he had heard that two cases of Asiatic flu have been diagnosed in the City. He wondered what the City might do about it. Mayor Stewart suggested that it was more a problem for the Provincial Department of Health but added that he would make enquiries regarding the matter.

SNOWBLOWER

In moving the resolution authorizing the purchase of a snowblower, Councillor J. P. Nicholson stated that the move was really the responsibility of the street committee as they had indicated the need for this equipment.

At first there had been an idea to purchase a payloader with a snowblower attachment. However it had been considered and a decision was taken that a

regular snowblower would be more serviceable to the City.

It was indicated that the cost of the equipment would be approximately \$16,000 although the actual cost will depend on the amount of the lowest acceptable tender.

OFFICE RENOVATION

It was also decided to call for tenders for the renovations of the City tax office and the City Clerk's office as per plans and specifications of J.P. Toombs, architect. The tenders for this job will also close at noon on September 19th.

The Council also authorized the expenditure of one hundred dollars to pay expenses of a two-man delegation from the City fire department to attend the Dominion Fire Chiefs' convention in Kentville on the week of September 16.

Tenders were authorized also for supplying the city with furnace fuel oil. They close at the same date.

Reporting on the city's financial position, Councillor E.W. Johnstone stated that the tax collections this year showed a very marked improvement over other years and he suggested this was due to the good work of the tax collector.

TAX COLLECTIONS

The education tax collected to date this year \$38,899.80 is

an increase of more than \$7,000 over the same date a year ago. The figures on arrears of educational tax indicate a similar result in that bracket. Councillor Johnstone added that the collection of sidewalk and street assessment also showed a marked improvement.

The chairman of finance noted the departments are keeping within their estimates.

The Council approved the granting of a building permit to Irving Oil Company for a service station in the corner of Weymouth and Fitzroy Street. The motion was put to a standing vote with all the councillors supporting it except Councillors A. Walthen Gaudet and G.R. Foster. Councillor Gaudet indicated that the sidewalk crews would be laid off September 15th. The catch basin crew would have to be kept on a bit longer as there were two basins that had cavities in them and must be repaired, it was explained.

It was stated that the necessary clearing work had to be done to permit the extension of Admiral Street east to Goodwill Avenue.

TAX OFFICE

Councillor F.G. O'Neill gave some detail on work to be done in the City Tax office. It includes putting in an acoustic ceiling with the present fluorescent lights embedded in it and several other incandescent lights installed for desks, etc. There will be hardboard walls to a height of eight feet. The radiators will be extended and will be enclosed in grating. A clothes closet will be installed for the staff and a horse-shoe counter will be erected to service the tax payers.

The new layout, Councillor O'Neill explained, will give more space for rearranging the desks. It will make for a very smart and modern office, he stated.

Councillor A.F. Gormley discussed the problem of extra parking space. He said that businessmen are telling him that the provision of extra downtown parking space is an absolute necessity. One suggestion was that parking areas be supplied on the perimeter of Rochford and Pownall Squares.

PARKING SPACE

There was criticism again, as there was some months ago, of the fact that so many store employees use up the parking space near the stores. This includes the market square and there were suggestions that the square should be metered or at least made a parking zone with a two-hour limit.

Nicholson noted the serious fire at the Patriot office and brought the Council's attention to the fact that the present system of fire alarms installed in homes of fire department members is becoming obsolete, and in some parts of the city is no longer working. It was decided to look into the cost and the possibility of installing a modern system.

Councillor Nicholson reported also that the new fire engine is reported ready to leave the plant of the manufacturers on Friday of this week. Exception was taken, however, to the suggestion of the suppliers that they were going to exhibit it at the Fire Chiefs' Convention at Kentville before bringing it here. The company is being so advised by wire.
