Maritime Fans Get Opportunity

MONCTON—Hockey fans in the Maritimes will have a better opportunity to see National Hockey League action at the Montreal Forum this season as a result of a new package deal announced by Canadian National Railways.

Under the new deal CN is offering NHL fans a special package rate which includes transportation, accommodation and a seat at Canadiens home games.

Canadian National will have available tickets to Saturday night games in Montreal for Atlantic Region Hockey enthusiasts. Special ticket arrangements can be made for groups travelling together and even more advantageous transportation rates will apply to groups.

The railway new plan, which is aimed at increasing off-peak travel by train between the Maritimes and Montreal, guarantees seats at the hockey game provided they are ordered before noon on the day before.

Canadian National's bargain rates for the package make it possible to travel to and from the game and obtain admission to the Forum for as low as \$20 from Moncton, \$28 from Saint John \$30 from Halifax and \$32 from Sydney.

Special rates have also been obtained at CN's Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal for hockey fans wishing to stay overnight and return the next day.

Canadian National is offering the scheme in various regions for a total of 35 home games featuring Montreal Canadiens.

Full details of the package deal can be obtained from CN passenger sales offices.

In the Atlantic Region special rates are in effect from the following centres: Sydney, Halifax, Truro, Charlottetown, Moncton, Saint John, Bathurst, Campbellton, Miramichi, Mont Joli, Rimouski and Riverview Du Loup.

Sony Liston's Still Making Life Miserable

BOSTON (AP)—The weather in New England on Veterans Day was damp and bleak but former heavyweight champion Ocean Liston made things miserable, as usual, for Faneua Cox. Amos Watson, Rod Gilbert and Bruce as Liston ran his list of sparring to 148 fights.

He has followed his announced plan of "floating like a butterfly and stinging like a bee" as he sharpened his left jab in many workouts.

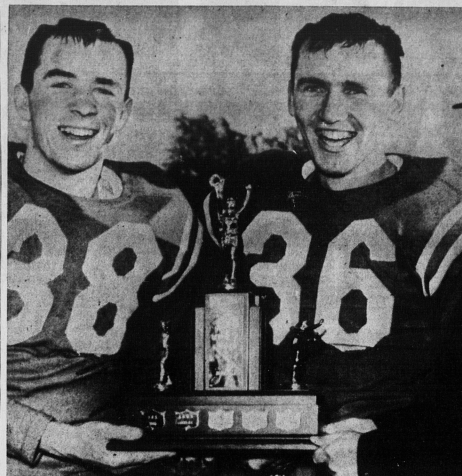
