SHIPPING NOTES.—The schr. Ernest Da Costa cleared on Saturday for Demerara with a cargo which included 850 bushels, 34 sacks and 245 crates potatoes, 13 crates lobsters, 80 sheep, 5 cows, 1 horse and 6 boxes codfish, shipped by G. H. Toombs.

The schr. Tarrar cleared to-day with 1500 bushels of potatoes, 300 bushels oats and 300 bushels turnips, shipped by Hugh McMillan, West River.

The schr. Poppy, fish master, arrived to-day from Newfoundland to load oats for that place.

FOR NOVEMBER.—At the police court during the month of November there were four convictions for violating the Scott Act; three for malicious injuries to property; one for nuisance; thirteen for drunkenness; one for annoying persons in their dwellings; one for larceny; and three for assault and battery. During the same period four Scott Act summonses and two summonses for using provoking language were dismissed. The receipts during the month amounted to \$24.29.

WITH BURGLARIOUS INTENT.—This morning about three o'clock the store of Connolly Bros., on Queen Street, was entered by three or four men evidently with burglarious intent. How they got in is not known, but it is thought an entrance was effected through a broken pane in the cellar window on Queen Street. They got through the street door after forcing the fastening. There she remained in a comatose condition until about one o'clock this morning when she died. Mrs. Corbin was about 70 years of age and was deservedly esteemed by all who knew her. She came to the city from Cornwall where she resided for many years, and where her remains will be taken for interment.

THE PROHIBITION QUESTION.

Mr. Hector's Lecture at the Opera House.

The Rev. J. H. Hector, better known as the Black Knight, opened fire in Charlottetown on Saturday night, when he spoke in the Opera House to the largest audience ever assembled within the walls of that place. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald presided, and introduced the lecturer. On the stage were the ladies of the W. C. T. U., Rev. Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, many well-known city clergymen and a number of other workers in the cause of temperance.

After Rev. Mr. Crossley had sung with much feeling "Can a Boy Forge His Mother," Rev. Mr. Hector was introduced, and after remarking that he did not come as a "learned lecturer"—he had never been to school in his life and had merely graduated from de locomotive—announced as his subject "The Devil Driven White."

Mr. Hector is a stalwart man, with a clear, ringing voice and a good command of language—in fact he may be regarded as an orator of no mean order. He looks and speaks not unlike our esteemed friend, Mr. Desmond. His address was pointed and practical, embellished with flashes of humor and a rough-and-ready-made quality of expression which readily evoked laughter and frequently called for hearty applause. His discourse dealt mainly with the liquor traffic and the evils of intemperance. He argued, in his plain, plain style, that the laws which legalized the sale of intoxicants are inconsistent with the whole tendency of British law—a fraud of clear-cut pattern—the worst which any civilized country ever witnessed. The rum traffic destroyed the peace and tranquility that the Government was bound to promote and maintain, therefore it ought not to be legalized. Moral suasion was shown to be a system of rags. Men were put up by the temperance societies to be knocked down by the rum-sellers. What was wanted was total prohibition of the traffic, a law under which the sale of intoxicants would not be permitted. The devil would never be routed until prohibition prevailed throughout all countries. The women of Canada were entitled to the very greatest credit for the good work they were doing along this line. Yesterday morning Rev. Mr. Hector preached in the Baptist Church to an immense congregation, speaking from the text, "Wash me and I shall be whiter than the snow." In the afternoon he preached in the Methodist Church from the text, "Let the wicked forsake his way." The church was crowded, and hundreds must have been turned away. A similar remark was applied to the service in Zion Church in the evening, where Rev. Mr. Hector preached from Job, 39-27. All the sermons were very effective, and are highly spoken of by those who heard them.

This evening Rev. Mr. Hector will address a temperance meeting to be held in the Opera House. Silver collection.

TRIBUTE TO A WORTHY ISLANDER.

The Austin Autograph of Nov. 7, a copy of which has been forwarded to The Examiner, contains several paragraphs referring to the lamented death of Ho. Spring, a few days previously, of Daniel F.
