ment was confined largely to the postal service, he also said the customs service and other "operating" branches of the civil service are to get the five-day, 40-hour week April 1 for certain employees.

The government announced in September it had approved this shortened work week from the existing average 44 hours will go into effect in those localities where it is the general practice for private business and industry.

Mr. Abbott said the list of localities will be announced soon by the civil service commission.

Maritime Board Of Trade Executive Meets At Moncton

Annual Meeting Of Caledonian Club

MONCTON—The executive council of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, meeting in Moncton Monday, took further steps toward the establishment of an Atlantic Provinces economic council, first proposed by the trade board at its meeting with provincial premiers Sept. 14.

An amended brief containing recommendations for the appointment of a 12-man formative committee to establish the policy scope and activities, and content of the eventual council, will be presented to the four premiers immediately.

This proposed economic council is expected to be based on the set-up of the New England Council and include the latter will be studied. Primary purpose of the new council be first to make a study of Maritime resources, attempt to bring new industries, and to assist those already established. This matter is being left in the hands of Nova Scotia whose Premier Angus Macdonald is heading the committee.

Of the other four projects the Joint Highway Safety Program and the Tourist Program are sponsored by Prince Edward Island with New Brunswick sponsoring the Educational Program and the meetings of the four Ministers of Industry and Natural Resources.

The brief will further urge co-operation in the early appointment of representatives in consultation with MTBT. Provincial directors of the organization will also consult with the respective premiers with a view to having them arrange representative four-province meetings in the fields of traffic safety, joint tourist promotion, education and trade and industry.

Reports presented showed that five Maritime boards of trade had affiliated during the past month, and that some 16 units had been made to community boards by directors and the executive.

Continued from page 1 "The position now," the owners added, "is that the deep-sea dry-cargo fleet cannot be operated in international trade under the Canadian flag, employing Canadian crews, except at heavy financial loss to the owners.

Asks Lift Curbs "On the other hand, since it has been decided that the Canadian government cannot provide any help to equalize the competitive position, the industry feels strongly that the government has no moral right to continue depriving owners of their freedom to exercise their ordinary commercial judgment."

The association said it wants the sale restrictions lifted both from ships under the Canadian flag—about 34—and from 92 that were transferred to the United Kingdom registry about in 1950 to reduce their operating costs.

The vessels were bought from the federal government after the last war, the contracts including a "covenant" under which they would not be sold without permission from the government.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C.—Mrs. Marie MacKenzie, wife of Dr. H. H. MacKenzie of 336 Fifth Avenue, died in hospital recently after a lengthy illness.

She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. N. MacLeod of Summerside, Prince Edward Island. Her father was a former Premier of Prince Edward Island and later a chief justice. She graduated from Acadia University and received her B.N. from Boston General Hospital, later serving as matron of the Summerside General Hospital and overseas with the Canadian Nursing Service during World War One. She received the Mons Medal, the Canadian Nursing Service Medal and was mentioned in dispatches.

She was married in London and resided in Nelson for more than 20 years before moving with her husband to the Royal City in 1941.

While at Nelson she was active in the I.O.D.E. and the Canadian Club. She also served as president of the Kootenay Lake General Ladies' Auxiliary. In New Westminster she was a member of the PEO and the February Circle of Queens Avenue United Church.

She leaves her husband, two sons, Kenneth, Roderick and Ian Malcolm; a sister, Mrs. John Holmes of Los Angeles, and a brother, Arthur MacLeod of Preston, Ark.

Mr. St. Laurent also reiterated a government statement last year that Canadian resources in the north, particularly water power, must be retained for Canadian use.

"Members will remember that some time ago there was a suggestion that these Yukon waters, or much of them could be diverted for development into Alaska.

"Well, they are Canadian waters and while we do not want to adopt any dog-in-the-manger attitude about our resources which cannot be used in our own country, I think that those which can be used in our country must be reserved for the generations that will follow us and who will develop this country."

Have A Trust After applause from all sides of the House, the prime minister added: "We do not want to be isolationists but we do feel we have a trust to future generations for the resources with which providence has endowed this vast land over which now our people exercise sovereignty."

Opposition leader Drew said President Eisenhower's suggestion Tuesday for use of fissionable materials as a source of power in countries lacking power resources could mean a great deal to Canada's north.

If the president's proposal for investigation of world-wide use of fissionable material for peaceful purposes were accepted by all countries, Canada's north could become "the centre of the greatest development known to man." North America's largest uranium deposits were in the Northwest Territories.
