### SENSATION IN LONDON

#### News That Lord Roberts Received Severe Injuries

#### BY THE FALL OF HIS HORSE.

Lord Roberts Declares That He  
Is Not Injured.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]  
LONDON, Nov. 22.—The Standard, in a special edition, says: "Just as we are going to press, the news has reached London that Lord Roberts has been thrown from his horse and received severe injuries. The accident occurred on Sunday last when he was riding. His horse fell with him and he was shaken and bruised, but no limbs were broken. As he has since despatched to the War Office it is believed that he is performing his usual duties, especially as he had not made mention of the accident."  
LONDON, Nov. 22.—A later despatch to the Standard says that Lord Roberts' bodyguard has removed him to the Government House in Johannesburg. He was badly shaken and bruised, but it is expected that he will be able to take his duties again in a few days. The Daily Telegraph learns that Lord Roberts telegraphed privately to the Secretary of State for War that he felt no ill effects whatever.

#### A BIG LOSS.

\$100,000 Steamer Wrecked—The  
Crew Saved.

#### CONVENTION AT GEORGETOWN.

Gordon and MacDonald Enthusiastically  
Nominated.

GEORGETOWN, Nov. 22.—A Conservative convention was held in the town hall last night to nominate candidates for the forthcoming election. It was a large and enthusiastic one. Delegates were present from Fortune and Murray Harbor North. J. B. Underhay was appointed chairman and T. E. Morrissey acted as secretary. Mr. Underhay, in calling the convention to order, stated the pleasure it gave him to preside over this respectable gathering.

Hon. D. Gordon then addressed the meeting on the question of the day, and on behalf of his colleagues and himself asked for a pure election to defeat an impure and bad government.

Hon. A. J. McDonald spoke in the same sense. Hon. D. Gordon, was proposed by Mr. J. A. Mathieson, Georgetown, seconded by Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, of Mitchell River, and the Hon. A. J. McDonald was proposed by Mr. Edwin McKie, Little River, seconded by Mr. Geo. Goff, Woodville.

There being no other nominations the chairman declared Messrs. Gordon and McDonald the unanimous choice of the convention.

Hon. Mr. Gordon, in accepting the nomination, thanked the electors for the honor done him. Mr. A. J. McDonald also spoke expressing his thanks for the honor accorded him. Ringing speeches were delivered by Messrs. Geo. McDonald, Annandale; John A. Mathieson, Georgetown; Roderick McLellan, St. George's; Capt. James Burke, Georgetown; J. W. McPhee, Annandale; Eugene McEachern, Georgetown; Wm. Connell, Georgetown; Geo. E. Goff, Esq., Woodville and Joseph McPherson, Launching.

Old Schooner Wrecked.

BOSTON, Nov. 21.—A message received here from North Brookville, Maine, says that the schooner *Polly* has been wrecked. She had 75,000 feet of lumber as a cargo, shipped at Bangor for Boston. The *Polly* was a 48 ton schooner, but she had the distinction of being the oldest craft in the American marine, having been built in 1805 at Amesbury. She was a two master, 51 feet long. Her career was full of interesting chapters, and much about her has been written from time to time. She was generally hauled out at Booth Bay harbor in the winter.

During the war of 1812, the *Polly* was a privateer and was instrumental in capturing a British gunboat in the war of 1812, off the coast of Maine.

She was the oldest schooner of her class afloat, and was a close competitor for the honor of being the oldest American vessel in active service, or in ordinary with the old Ironsides (Constitution), at the navy yard.

#### CANNOT BE SUPPRESSED.

Is Impossible to Check Boxer  
Movement.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—The special correspondent of the New York Tribune, in his special cable letter from Paris, this morning says: "One of the sensational principal events of the week has been the interview with his excellency, Yu Keng, Chinese minister in Paris, published in the *Matin*. The chief utterances attributed to Yu Keng are: "There is only one way to save Europe from sanguinary surprise and to serve as a foundation for pacification and complete accord, and that is the disappearance of that woman, (the Empress,) and the restoration of the Emperor."

If His Excellency be correctly quoted he will do wise to keep out of the reach of the Empress "celebrated cutting process." The other utterance contains food for reflection: "All the diplomatic measures which could be subscribed to will not succeed in suppressing the Boxers."

This would indicate the existence of a Chinese national movement, and, if this is so, a fearful menace to the future peace of Europe.

The opinion is general here that by renewing the mistakes of the past, "a Chinese question" will be created which will predominate during the whole of the twentieth century and oblige Europe to continue indefinitely her present costly efforts.
