Controversial Deportation Cases Being Reconsidered

OTTAWA (CP) — Immigration Minister Favreau is reconsidering a number of controversial deportation cases including that of a 16-year-old Iranian boy, Siamon, and a 19-year-old Iranian boy, Siamon, who were deported after a change of government enabled the new minister to become acquainted with each case and to determine whether the deportation order should remain undisturbed.

Lesage Flies To Ottawa Talks Which He Virtually Provoked

QUEBEC (CP) — Premier Lesage flew to Ottawa Thursday for a federal-provincial conference that he virtually provoked by his opposition to federal plans for portable pensions and municipal laws.
In his government's desire to prevent possible provincial field ahead of the federal government, Mr. Lesage has the unanimous support of the legislature, including the Union Nationale opposition.
The legislature has passed a resolution accusing Prime Minister Pearson's government of brooking an election promise and seeking the cooperation of the provinces in setting up a federal fund for municipal laws and development.
Another resolution claiming that federal steps to set up a portable pensions plan would interfere with provincial rights to receive the unanimous support of the legislature.

TC A PLANE SAFE
LONDON (Reuters) — A Trans-Canada Air Lines DC-8 jetliner with 107 passengers and crew of nine aboard touched down safely at London Airport Wednesday after the pilot detected a power loss in the hydraulic system while flying over Prestwick, Scotland. The plane crashed more than 1,000 miles out over the Atlantic when the instrument panel for the engine failed. The craft was flying from Cleveland and Toronto.

1. Four spades. It is hard to imagine a hand partner might have for a spade bid that would not produce a satisfactory play for game, and there would be no particularly good reason for not bidding four spades at least three spades, which North would be at liberty to pass. The hearts need not be assigned, since a satisfactory trump suit has already been found.
2. Two spades. Game is virtually out of the question, since all that partner did was overcall in the one level, thus indicating probable loss of the values for an opening bid.
The only real question is whether it is better to bid two hearts or two spades. Prefer-

Norris Report Is Discussed

OTTAWA (CP) — Top officials of the Canadian Labor Congress met Wednesday with Labor Minister MacEachen to discuss the Norris report on Great Lakes labor lawlessness.
Informants said there was a frank exchange of views on the controversial proposals of Mr. Justice T. G. Norris to clean up capitalism, tyranny and violence in waterfront unionism.
The Vancouver jurist proposed a three-man trusteeship on marine labor after finding that the Seafarers' International Union of Canada was a lawless dictatorship of SIU President Hal G. Brown, which may be a stranglehold on lake shipping.
In the Commons Mr. MacEachen said that the cabinet will determine whether legislative action based on the Norris report can be introduced before Parliament adjourns for its summer recess, which may be at the end of next week.
