ICAO Adopts U. S. System Despite British Protests

MONTREAL (CP)—The International Civil Aviation Organization Wednesday adopted over British protests an American-developed system as a navigation aid standard for the world's airlines until Jan. 1, 1975.

But the British delegation clearly indicated after the delegates' vote that the United Kingdom intended to continue using and developing its own Decca navigation system, an aid for both ships and aircraft.

The special ICAO conference on short-range navigation aids adopted as the standard the American Distance Measuring Element (DMET) as a complement to the very high frequency omnidirectional radio range (VOR), now in general use. This system provides the pilot with his direction and distance from the VOR station, making it possible for him to determine his position quickly on a map.

When asked whether Britain planned to continue using Decca as a navigation aid, he replied "certainly."

protection date of VOR to Jan. 1, 1975 from Jan. 1, 1966. It was first adopted by ICAO in 1949. CHARGES OBSTRUCTION Following the vote, Capt. Veal said no quantitative details on the accuracy and performance on the American system were provided the conference.

"We felt there was complete obstruction to the development of that quantitative data," said the British delegate. "We deprecate this and feel that as a result we have not done the work we should have done. If we had we wouldn't have taken the decisions taken today."

Capt. Veal charged the reasons for the obstruction "probably were activated by preconceived ideas that VOR-DMET would be found wanting when compared with a hyperbolic aid (Decca)."

He noted that although the International Air Transport Association, representing most of the world's airlines, favored the American system, airline pilots generally favored the British system.

The IATA observer countered that the airlines are the users of the systems and their decisions are based on the judgment of the best pilots in the service.
