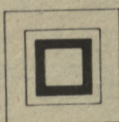

chemicals were "unknown"; in that people had just placed them in unmarked jars, and thus were treated as highly dangerous.

For the removal of these chemicals a whole building was cordoned off and a police and Armed Forces bomb disposal squad came in to carry the chemicals to a specially designed truck, used for bomb disposal purposes. This

truck then proceeded under police escort to the CFB Gagetown training area, where these chemicals were disposed of by the use of explosives.

I would imagine that what you propose is like keeping a time bomb in your basement; much more dangerous than small amounts of chemicals flowing into the sewage treatment plant periodically.
