

# Robinson, Gene Fullmer In Ch'ship Bout Tonight

NEW YORK (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, a proud but aging champion, risks his world middleweight title against young Gene Fullmer, a 25-year-old strongboy from West Jordan, Utah, Wednesday night at Madison Square Garden.

Despite Sugar Ray's brilliant career and his record-breaking feat of winning the same title three times, he is a 6½-to-5 underdog in this 15-round match. It will be the fourth straight time the opponent has been favored and Robinson has won the previous three—two from Rocky Castellani and two from Bobo Olson.

The old lure of a canny veteran with both boxing skill and punching power against a sturdy bullethead youngster is expected to draw 14,000 fans into the garden and a \$150,000 gate despite the holiday spending binge. The fight starts at 10 p.m. EST. (11 p.m. AST).

**HEAVY TAKE FOR RAY**  
With an additional \$100,000 dumped into the till from the radio-television rights, it will be a sweet night for the sugar man who gets \$60,000 of the radio-TV cash and 47½ per cent of the net gate. Fullmer gets little more than the exercise and a chance at the title. His manager, Marv Jensen, signed for no cut of the TV fee and only 12½ per cent of the gate. That should result in about \$120,000 for Robinson and \$18,000 for Fullmer.

Robinson, who is 35 if you listen to him or 36 if you look in the record book, has plans for a February match at Miami with Ralph (Tiger) Jones, his lone conqueror since he started his comeback in 1955. He also hopes to meet Carmen Basilio, the welter champion, in a middleweight championship outdoor fight in June. All this depends, of course, on the Fullmer scrap. There even has been some talk of an ultimate match with

heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson. Fullmer has nothing on his mind except the Robinson bout. He is fighting for a small purse and his entire future hinges on a victory. The copper mine worker from Utah has a 37-3 record for only 40 pro fights as compared with Robinson's long 146-bout career dating back to 1940. Ray has a 138-4-3 record plus one no decision match.

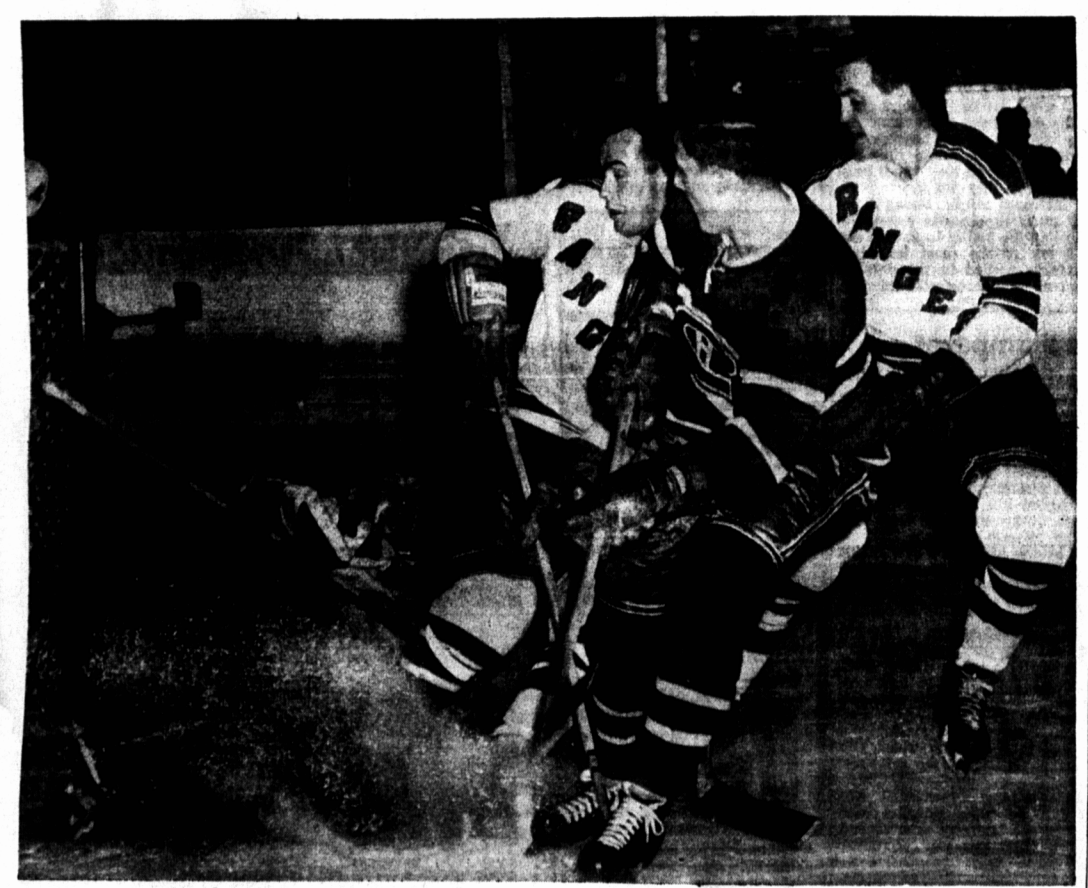
**MANY EXPECT KO**  
Although many expect the bout to end in a knockout, the records of the two fighters show nothing but iron jaws. Robinson was stopped only once in the steaming heat of Yankee Stadium when he tried to move out of his class to lift Joey Maxim's light heavyweight crown. Fullmer never has been stopped and they say he was down only twice in bouts with Bobby Boyd and Gil Turner. It is difficult to get a fair line

on Robinson, the dancing man who came out of the Golden Gloves to win the world welter crown in 1946 and move up to the middle class in 1951. After losing his title to Randy Turpin in London, he won it back later the same year in New York with a dramatic 10th-round knockout. He retired in 1952 after the maximum match but came back to dethrone Bobo Olson Dec. 12, 1955 at Chicago. He fought only twice in 1956, Olson in May at Los Angeles and Bob Provvizi in November at New Haven, and won both.

In 1956 Fullmer whipped Castellani, Gil Turner, Tiger Jones, Charley Humer and Moses Ward. The three defeats in his career were suffered in '55 at the hands of Turner, Boyd and Eduardo Lausse.

The weigh-in will be held Wednesday noon in the Garden.

The pick here is Robinson on the strength of the old days, perhaps only a mirage.

## Vast Crowds See Football Tussles

NEW YORK (CP)—Vast crowds totalling 264,500 turned out Tuesday for an old American New Year's Day custom — watching some of the best college football teams in the United States maul and batter each other across the fields of sunlit stadiums.

Befitting the high rank and extraordinary skills of the teams involved, most games were close, hard-fought contests with three being decided by the margin of one touchdown or less.

Baylor defeated Tennessee 13-7 in the Sugar Bowl, Colorado outlasted Clemson 27-21 in the Orange Bowl and Texas Christian slipped by Syracuse in the Cotton Bowl 28-27. In the Sun Bowl, George Washington edged Texas Western 13-0 and Prairie View clobbered Texas Southern University 27-6 in the 29th annual Prairie View Bowl.

But at the Rose Bowl, a capacity crowd of 100,000 in Pasadena, Calif., saw a fired-up Iowa team run Oregon State ragged to win an easy 35-19 victory.

In New Orleans, unsung sophomore quarterback Buddy Humphrey bulled over the goal line from one foot to give Baylor victory in the fourth quarter over Tennessee, second-ranking team in the country. The hero of the Baylor victory, however, was fullback Del Shofner who ran the Volunteer defenses ragged all afternoon and outshone Tennessee's All-American Johnny Majors, playing one of his lesser games.

In Miami, the Orange Bowl crowd of 72,352 saw Colorado's John (The Beast) Bayluk barrel over from the one-yard line in the final quarter to give the Buttery over Clemson.

Despite a spectacular one-man performance by Syracuse's All-American Jim Brown, Texas Christian edged the Orangemen before 68,000 Cotton Bowl fans at Dallas, Tex.

Brown, from Manhasset, N.Y., slashed up and down the field all afternoon and scored 21 points. But had he scored the 22nd point, a conversion try blocked by end would have had a tie.

## Ortiz Shakes Off Knockdown To Win Over Gale Kerwin

## Iowa Crushes Oregon State 35-19 In Rose Bowl Classic

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Iowa unleashed quarterback Kenny Ploen on a bolting 49-yard touchdown run in the first five minutes of play Tuesday and the hammering Hawkeyes went on from there to crush Oregon State in the Rose Bowl 35-19.

The Iowa victory, before 100,000 fans, was the 10th time in 11 games a Big Ten team has demonstrated its superiority over Pacific Coast Conference competition.

Ploen's smashing run was to be followed by a succession of touchdowns played by the third quarter, with the score 26-6, many of the visitors from the corn belt were gazing around this famed old battle pit looking for movie stars instead of the massacre on the field.

## Papers Criticize System Of Awarding Peerages

LONDON (CP)—The system of awarding peerages and other honors to outstanding British subjects came under heavy fire in the British press Tuesday because of the failure to grant a knighthood to Stanley Matthews, considered soccer's greatest star.

Charges of "class prejudice" and "snobbery" appeared in the sports pages of almost every London paper.

The tabloid Daily Mirror described the Queen's New Year's honors list as "the most yawning, fawning, rabbit-timid list ever to be churned out of the sleepy glades of Whitehall."

Matthews, still a star at 41 after 25 years in Britain's most popular sport, was made a commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in the honors list.

The Queen actually selects few—if any—of the persons to be honored. They are picked by governmental departments high ranking civil servants and the like.

The CBE is considered an honor but it had been generally accepted in many parts of the world—would get a knighthood.

**MATTHEWS IS FIRST**

Failure to give him one stirred old charges that professional athletes — and particularly professional footballers — get short shrift from the social arbiters of the country. Matthews is the first professional soccer player to appear on an honors list.

A Daily Express sports columnist said:

"Quite bluntly I say that Matthews was not knighted because of the snob attitude to professional football, because far too many people regard the professional as someone well, not quite the type, old boy."

In the past, such professional athletes as Len Hutton and Gordon Richards were knighted. But Hutton was a cricket star and Richards a jockey and both sports are considered "highly respectable."

Matthews himself stayed out of the controversy.

The English and international right winger described the award as "a great honor not only for me but for all professional footballers."

**WAS IT SNOB?**

The Daily Mirror described the CBE as a "pitty medal" and a "snub for 'Sir soccer'."

"What's so wrong with football? Isn't it dignified enough for knighthoods?"

The Mirror also complained: "The honors list has dust on it before the printer's ink is dry. It pays tribute to the nine-to-five men, the citizens of sober habits, the worthy knitter of Balaclav helmets. But it has only withered laurels to offer the men who put the fire in this country's belly."

The Daily Sketch said the CBE is "hardly enough. Why not Sir Stanley?"

The Sketch said: "The (Matthews) magic which, in a quarter of a century, has become a British institution has also thrilled the Africans, east, south and west. From Hong Kong in the Far East to Canada in the north west Matthews has created, in his degree, a lasting goodwill for the mother country." The paper speculated that a knighthood had been deferred until Matthews stops playing soccer.

The Daily Mail admitted fans of football throughout the country had expected to greet Matthews Tuesday as "Sir Stan."

Quoting a former teammate of Matthews, it said: "Football is still regarded as a game for the working classes, the poor people."

The Daily Herald said: "This compromise between knighthood and nothing is one more snub to soccer, one more example of the condescending attitude to our greatest national game."

A News Chronicle columnist asked a point-blank: "Why no knighthood for the greatest and most beloved character of any British sportsfield—indeed on any international sportsfield?"

## Paul Larivee Displaces Elik As AHL'S Scoring Leader

NEW YORK (AP)—Paul Larivee of Providence has displaced Cleveland's Bo Elik as the American Hockey League's leading scorer while boosting his point output to 56.

League statistics including games of Dec. 30 showed that Elik, who had led the last 10 weeks, dropped to second with 52 points. Larivee, a 26-year-old centre, collected nine points last week while Elik, a rookie, had four.

Cleveland's Fred Glover and Jimmy Moore hold down third and fourth places with 51 and 46 points respectively. Camille Henry of Providence rounds out the top five with 44.

Henry has caged the most goals, 29, and Larivee and Moore share the assists lead with 51 each.

Providence's Johnny Bowler has the best goal-tending average, 2.54 and Larry Zeldi of Hershey has been assessed the most penalty minutes, 112.

## Gord Howe Scores Lone Goal As Red Wings Blank Rangers

NEW YORK (CP)—Old Pro Gord Howe scored the only goal of the game and his 24th of the year to give Detroit Red Wings a 1-0 victory over New York Rangers Monday night. The victory put the Wings into first place in the National Hockey League by a 20-point margin over the idle Boston Bruins.

Howe, in his 11th NHL season, scored the winner at 12:02 of the second period, with credit for assists going to Ted Lindsay and Red Kelly. With 47 points for the season, the Floral, Sask., right winger now is only five points behind the league scoring leader, Jean Beliveau of Montreal.

The Rangers loss was their first on New Year's Eve in their first since Oct. 24, 1955.

Only two penalties were called in the clean, almost gentle game, both against New York. One of them, against Larry Poppen for holding, was in effect, when Howe scored his goal from 15 feet out.

Glenn Hall, Detroit's goalie, made 21 saves in recording his second shutout of the season. Gump Worsley, in the Rangers nets, had 27 stops.

## His Legs Are Not Old

NEW YORK (AP)—Gene Fullmer, a young man with taking ways, and Ray Robinson, a free giver, meet for the world middleweight championship at Madison Square Garden Wednesday night, and we like the guy who hands it out to retain his title.

Maybe we're doing it from memory the memory of the fight who once was a just about the best fighting machine we ever saw.

The Robinson of memory would have made a routine job of chopping up and cutting down the study westerner, who is easy to hit, relying on his durability to take what comes his way and still keep moving forward.

**LONG FURLOUGH**

In picking Robinson we do it with a full knowledge of Fullmer's youth, strength, aggressiveness and determination.

We pick Sugar Ray knowing he's old as fighters go, and that he took a long furlough from ring activity before making his comeback.

But we recall his two fights with Bobo Olson, and the neatness and dispatch with which Robinson disposed of harried Bobo was impressive.

We are well aware of what happened to other fighters who either tried a comeback or stayed around too long. The wear and tear of the years finally caught up with them.

The disintegration usually first shows itself in the legs, but we believe Robinson's dancing career kept his legs trim and agile.

**THE BIG QUESTION**
