Schooner Loading At Georgetown

One of the latest loadings on record is being carried on at Georgetown as the Newfoundland Auxiliary schooner "Philip E. Lake" takes on a cargo of heavy timber and produce for Newfoundland.

The 95-ton engine powered, two masted schooner with a six man crew, under command of Captain Thornhill arrived in Georgetown on Wednesday, January 28th from Fortune, Newfoundland. The schooner has made numerous trips from this port during the summer and fall months and has already loaded here since New Year's.

The harbour is entirely free of ice and the late shipping upholds its record as the province's winter port.

Montague Club Threatens To Quit League

As a result of a disagreement respecting the eligibility of L. Schurman, the Montague Hockey Club last night withdrew from the King's County Hockey League, thus granting to Murray Harbour the right to meet Georgetown in the finals.

The disagreement arose following a game played in Murray Harbour Monday night, won by Montague 7-6, in which Schurman played. Murray Harbour protested the game, contending that Schurman was not a bona fide resident of Montague, having arrived late last week. The Montague club contended that he fulfilled the rules in that he was working and living in Montague, which made him a resident and eligible to play.

After considerable discussion, the president, Major John A. MacDonald, M.L.A., asked for a vote. The Montague delegates abstained. The vote carried 3-1 in favor of the ineligibility of Schurman to play in the league. However, it was then decided that a final decision would be given on or before February 1st, so that the teams involved might have an opportunity to get together in an attempt to resolve the difficulty.
