We hope the Supervisor will look to the matter, and make the track sufficiently wide, or not make one at all.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Crossing at the Capes.

Special Despatch to the Examiner. THE following was intended for publication yesterday:—

CAPE TORMENTINE, Feb. 6. Fine day; and no boats crossing on account of the lolly caused by yesterday's northeast snowstorm. The assistance of a steamer would remedy the trouble.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6. Notice is given in the Quebec Official Gazette of an Act to Incorporate the Great National Lottery of Quebec with a view of aiding the construction and maintenance of new churches and religious institutions, and of promoting the colonization of unsettled lands in the Province of Quebec, and to authorize the issue of their lottery tickets. The Free Press editorially predicts a dissolution of Parliament next summer. Post offices are in course of erection at Belleville, St. Catharines and Hartford.

HALIFAX, Feb. 6. Mayor Fraser, this morning had a consultation with Dr. Wickwire, the health officer of the port, and Dr. Moran, city medical officer, regarding the action of Captain Ritchie, of the "Peruvian," in taking his steamer to the wharf, in spite of warnings of the pilot that she should be anchored in quarantine when there was a case of small-pox on board. It was decided that the captain was liable to a fine of four hundred dollars, and the Mayor requested it be imposed. The total majority for the Canada Temperance Act in the County of Inverness, Cape Breton, is over 850.

LONDON, Feb. 6. The death is announced of Major Sir Wm. Palliser, C. B., inventor of the Palliser projectiles, and improvement in the construction of heavy guns. He was born in Dublin on June 18, 1830. The second deposit of £200 a side, for the Hanlan-Boyd match, due to-morrow, was made yesterday. Hanlan had a short spin on Saturday. There was a dense fog. He rowed eight miles to-day.

JACKSONVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 6. Ten miles of the north-western division of the Nashville and St. Louis Railway was submerged by the overflow of the Tennessee River in the past fifteen days. The railway is now six feet under water and cannot be operated before the end of this week.

NICE, Feb. 6. There are forty-six entries for the Grand Prix, including several American horses.
