Fatal and Disastrous Boiler Explosion.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Sept. 15. The boiler of the Central Railroad engine, at Eubaula, Ala., exploded to-day, killing four men and injuring several others. About 400 bales of cotton were burned. The loss is \$100,000.

Another Egyptian Conference.

CAIRO, Sept. 15. Lord Northbrook, British High Commissioner, Sir Evelyn Baring, British diplomatic agent, Nubar Pasha, Egyptian Prime Minister, Edgar Vincent Fitzgerald, and Ormstein, have held a meeting for the consideration of Egyptian finances.

News from General Gordon.

CAIRO, Sept. 15. A man of the Gared tribe from Kordofan has gone into Egyptian lines who states that General Gordon has taken two Islands near Senarra, and that the Sheiks of Denghithave several times defeated the Mahdi.

Floods in Spain.

MADRID, Sept. 15. Severe floods are prevailing around Grona. The rivers Leo and Onah have risen. Considerable loss of life and damage to property is reported.

Japan Stands Neutral.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15. The associated press advices from Japan state that the Japanese Government have proclaimed neutrality in the Franco-Chinese war.

King Humbert's Departure.

NAPLES, Sept. 15. A great throng of people witnessed the departure of King Humbert from this city. The scene was very pathetic, the King personally received hundreds of petitions.

Crop Prospects in India.

LONDON, Sept. 15. Advice from India report that there has been a favorable rain fall in Bengal, but the drought still continues in Madras. In Mysore there have been serious floods.

A Temporary Appointment.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15. Assistant Secretary Charles E. Coon has been designated by the President as acting Secretary for Treasury for ten days from to-day.

Disturbances in Turkey.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 15. The authorities are about to send one thousand reinforcements to Albania, to quell disturbances along the frontier.

Joining the Mahdi.

CAIRO, Sept. 15. The Kamilab tribes report all the Sheiks on the frontier of Abyssinia have joined the Mahdi.

More Dynamite.

LONDON, Sept. 15. A dynamite cartridge has been found at Leeds in a petroleum cask which came from America.

Aid for Cholera Sufferers.

PARIS, Sept. 15. The fee given in this city in aid of the cholera sufferers has been a great success.

Canadian News.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15. The son of the Hon. Mr. Carling, and a daughter of Mr. Pattee, the lumber king, have eloped, married, and started on a tour of the United States. Stern parents were the trouble. Mrs. Pattee deeming her daughter "too young to marry."
The Rocky Mountain excursionists nearly met with fatality, just after leaving a tunnel, fifty tons or more of rock fell, and carried away the bridge.
