## Some Frost Damage To Tobacco Reported

Severe frost damage to some P.E.I. tobacco fields was reported yesterday from such widely scattered areas as Rusticoville and Brudenell, although it was impossible to find how other growers fared.

Experimental Farm weather observer Warren Burns, said the grass level temperature during the night dropped to 23 degrees, of frost. The official temperature—its taken at a height of three and one-half to four feet—was 34 degrees, he said.

Mr. Burns recalled that the

grass-level temperature dropped to 24 degrees on June 19, when the air temperature was 55, but little damage was caused then except for the yellowing of some tips in grain fields.

Men were all in the fields yesterday but a report from the Mercurys home in Brudenell indicated the crop there was "pretty well all killed." Mrs. Myra M. Gallant, Rusticoville, said they hoarded their crop was still very hard. Robert Gannau, an Ontario man who is in partnership with Mr. Gallant, was out in the field and not available

A trip to the Murray Harbour area yesterday showed damage to flowers at level all-around, though the higher parts of the stems were not damaged. White frost was reported heavy at Montauque yesterday.

The lower part of the tobacco field at John Power's in Greenfield was caught, but the rest of the plants seemed all right, it was learned from Mrs. Power yesterday.

Most of the tobacco men said last week at a meeting in Rosemeath they would need several weeks to finish harvesting their crop, although Douglas Robinson, Ocean View, said a week of good weather would see it in pretty well through.

Mr. Gallant said though that his crop was late and would probably take until well on into the middle of October to complete harvesting.

The severity of the frost varied in different areas, and depended on the elevation and the position, relative to the ability of an air flow to drain the cold air away.

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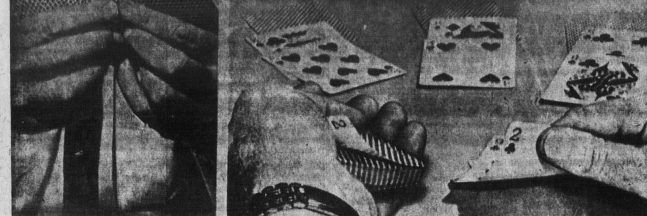

The Gordon property, adjacent to a government park, was bought by the department of industry and natural resources for possible park enlargement which may include a golf course.

The department of industry has advertised 14 buildings on the property for sale; the buildings must be removed by March of next year.
